



### Mike Flirts With Charmer Who's Bogus

Carrigan Falls for Auto Siren on Seattle Trade Tour

M. J. Carrigan was the life of the party when the Seattle Chamber of Commerce delegation went to Lewiston, Idaho.

And also the object of the delegation's biggest laugh. When the special cars rolled into Lewiston they were welcomed by a troop of mounted cowboys and cow-girls, there for the annual round-up and fair. There was a brass band, 500 shouting citizens, a parade and lots of enthusiasm.

Then the visitors were taken in automobiles up Lewiston's famous hill highway. It was strictly a stag party, with one solitary exception. One big car carried in its back seat a smartly garbed woman. "Mike" was ushered into the tonneau of this car. It was with no reluctance he got in. Up the ten miles of Lewiston's famous highway and down the same ten miles he rode with the charming fair one, and found her delightful. In fact, he later bragged just a little bit about his unusual good fortune in being the one member from Seattle who had feminine company.

There was some whispering among even the Lewiston committee as to the identity of the beautiful stranger. Not until the next day, when the train was rolling along toward Walla Walla and the Seattle delegation met for a business session in Alex Tindling's private car, did the truth come out. President Boyms announced it. The "woman" was a Lewiston man, and "Mike" Carrigan hasn't got thru blushing yet.

But at that, "Mike" was unquestionably the favored member. At the railway station in Lewiston he was lauded by no other than Kitty Cairns, champion horsewoman of the world, recipient of a flattering write-up in the current Ladies' and Lewiston resident, "Mike," the captive, even rode behind the lady during part of the parade.

Later, when a banquet was in progress at the hotel, Kitty rode right into the dining room on her charger and there was a warm scramble for her, C. E. Roberts, president of the Imperial Candy company, won her favor that time and was given a ride with Kitty down Main st.

The Lewiston hill road is, without exaggeration, one of the real wonders of the whole West. It rises from the Clearwater bridge, which is about 700 feet above sea level, by a series of amazing switchbacks with hairpin corners to the great plateau of the Palouse country, 2,700 feet elevation, in 10 miles.

No foot of the road is more than 5 per cent grade. The view throughout the entire course of the 10 miles up the face of the hill and at the top is fit to rank with any view in the world, the visitors declared, for charm and grandeur. The Blue mountains, a great sweep of both the Snake and Clearwater rivers, a hundred-mile stretch of fertile grain, fruit and cattle country, and the peaks of Lewiston and Clarkston are a few of the details in the picture, which embraces parts of three states.

Not the least amazing feature of this road is the fact that it cost only \$150,000 to build, crushed rock surface and all. And it is already paid for save \$50,000.

Lewiston, the just in the infancy of its probable growth as a business center, is no spring chicken as Western towns go. Sixty years back it was a city of 400 persons, mostly huddled in tents. A placer gold strike had been made on the Clearwater river and for a time the camp was prosperous in typical wild Western fashion.

Again later Lewiston became a city of 4,000 when it rose to the dignity of a distributing center for all Northern Idaho and much of Montana. Goods came in by river steamer and were relayed on from there by pack trains. Some of these pack trains in those historic days consisted of 100 mules.

Now Lewiston is the largest in its history, being credited by the federal census with 6,500, and Clarkston with more than 3,000.

Washington State College's greatest present problem, President Holland told the visitors when they came to Pullman, is housing for students. A dormitory for women which will accommodate more than 100 has just been completed. This was financed by citizens of Pullman. Under the plan adopted it will pay for itself in 10 years and become the property of the college. The state has built other new living quarters for students this summer, but not enough, and several hundred applicants for admission will have to be turned down.

The snow which fell in the Palouse country Sunday and Monday astonished the Seattle visitors. It also astonished the natives, for it was the earliest on record.
