ceiving ward, and of the 108 men in my ward there are easily 80 who are physically considerably stronger than I am, and should I or any other attendant ever lose all manhood and use brutality in handling the patients, we would last no time.

We would either, if one of our doctors or supervisors found it out (and they do find it out in nine out of ten cases) be fired so quickly that we would find hardly time to pack our suitcase, or the patients would take the law in their own hands and deal with us in a less merciful way.

Let it be stated right here, that as far as this hospital is concerned there is "no brutality," and even in a case of self-defense we get fired if we hurt our patient.

Whenever a patient becomes violent and is put into a camisole it is not done for our sake, but to protect the other patients and himself.

CALLED ON CARPET IF PATIENTS ARE HIT

It has been my own painful experience to suffer a black eye or swollen lip with no provocation whatsoever, but even in these instances I have never had the desire or inclination to hit back, and I know it to be a fact that no brutality is used on any of our wards.

It happens that one patient hits another before any of the attendants can separate them, and even then we get called on the carpet and have to answer for it.

I could tell of many instances and show that the life of an attendant is anything but easy, yet I let this be sufficient and state only that it really takes a bigger and warmer heart and considerably more patience and self-restraint to be an attendant in an insane asylum than the dear public will give us credit for.

We do our work and our duty because we are big enough to know that somebody must take care of those poor unfortunates who cannot take care of themselves, and we will go ahead and do what is expected of us in spite of longer hours and lower pay than a working man on the outside.

We find our reward in our work and duty well done—the knowledge that we are doing good to those who very often have been cast out of society and have no other friend but the doctors and attendants.

Says Ireland Will Confer as Free State

DUBLIN, Sept. 15.—Ireland will negotiate as a free state, according to the reply of President De Valera to Premier Lloyd George's invitation to a conference at Inverness, which was issued here today, contained this definite statement.

The British prime minister had insisted that Ireland, remaining a part of the empire must be accepted by Sinn Fein before the conference could take place. De Valera's note today pointed out that Ireland already had declared her independence. It stated that Sinn Fein had no objection to entering a conference to discuss the association of Ireland with the British empire, but that Ireland would negotiate as a sovereign state.

RHEINSTROM TO GO TO TRIAL

Former Partner of Ole Hanson Up Sept. 21

George Rheinstrom, formerly in the real estate business in Seattle with Ex-Mayor Ole Hanson, has been indicted by the U. S. grand jury on a charge of using the U. S. mail service to defraud, and will go on trial in Spokane Wednesday, September 21.

Rheinstrom has been accused of defrauding in the sale of property which he claimed to be directly adjoining the Bremerton navy yards, but which in reality, it is charged, is in the woods of Charleston. He is out on \$5,000 bail.

Judge Labels Dry Work an "Outrage"

SPOKANE, Sept. 15.—Federal prohibition officers may enter a private dwelling on a booze raid only when evidence of sale has been found.

This is the ruling made by Federal Judge Frank Rutkin in the case of Gus Powell, on whose ranch near Spokane a 30-gallon copper boiler and 100 gallons of mash were found. Articles seized will have to be returned to the owner.

Judge Rutkin declared that the conduct of the officers was "an outrage."

Citizens Battle Circus Employees

TOPPENISH, Wash., Sept. 15.—Fifty citizens of Toppenish last night did battle royal with the crew of employees of the Palmer circus. A number of shots were fired in the melee without serious damage. The circus gang was getting the worst of it when the train, minus many windows, pulled out of town.

Mother of Alleged Slayer Is Grilled

CHICAGO, Sept. 15.—Mrs. Elizabeth Church, aged mother of Harvey Church, confessed murderer of Bernard Daugherty and Carl Ausmus, Packard motor car salesman, was put thru the "third degree" by police today.

Ben Newmark, chief investigator of the state's attorney's office, is working on the theory that the mother had knowledge of the slayings.

TACOMA.—F. A. Hazeltine, editor South Bend Journal, appointed general supervisor of federal prohibition agents by Roy Haynes, federal prohibition commissioner.

JOBBS!

71,267 unemployed in Coast States; need for work is more pressing.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 15.—Unemployed workmen in the three Pacific coast states of Oregon, Washington and California total 71,267, according to an official estimate given out today by John A. Kelly, district director of the United States department of labor.

By states, the figures were: California, 45,450; Oregon, 9,348; Washington, 16,471. San Francisco showed the largest number of unemployed, 17,975. Los Angeles was second, 10,950, and Oakland third, with 9,638. Seattle showed 1,240; Portland, 9,048; Tacoma, 4,260. Other cities were: California—San Diego, 235; San Jose, 1,380; Stockton, 1,115; Fresno, 820; Sacramento, 3,974; Berkeley, 378. Oregon—Astoria, 300. Washington—Everett, 775; Spokane, 2,437; Bellingham, 1,825.

When the brother died a short time later, from the effects of the cold, and Mary's left leg was frozen and had to be amputated above the knee.

Mary was taken to live with her grandmother at Mountain Village, Dr. Condit relates, but finally the government teacher there put her on a barge and sent her down the Yukon to take the steamer for Seattle, and go on to the school at Chemsawa. The girl had practically no clothing, and an old sourdough at Mountain Village gave her \$20 to purchase some.

Mary was supplied with crutches when her leg was amputated, but these are too short now, and have been broken several times. Last Sunday night during services on the Victoria, Dr. Condit brought the little Indian girl's case to the attention of the passengers, and they took up a collection of \$105 to buy her an artificial limb.

This amount has been found to be insufficient. An artificial limb of the right kind costs \$150 or more. Dr. Condit has deposited the \$105 with the United States bureau of education in the Smith building, to be used as seems best for Mary.

Dr. Condit was joined in Seattle by his wife, and they will return to Alaska together next week.

Larson Acquitted; Another Trial Due

TACOMA, Sept. 15.—Ole R. Larson, president of the defunct Scandinavian-American bank of Tacoma, charged with embezzlement of \$20,000 from the bank, was acquitted by a jury in the superior court here Wednesday afternoon. He is scheduled for another trial soon on the charge of mishandling funds.

Gustaf Lindberg, former director of the bank, was charged with wrongfully borrowing \$13,000 from the bank immediately after Larson's trial by Prosecuting Attorney J. W. Selden.

Taxpayers Hand Over More Cash


WASHINGTON, Sept. 15.—Taxpayers today were handing \$255,000,000 over to the government, the third installment of their income and profits taxes.




