WINE MAKING IN HOMES ON MAT

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16.—The
whole question of home wine mak-
ing was being considered today by
Prohibition Commissioner Haynes
who may ask the department of Jus-
tice for a new ruling on the sub-
ject.

Reports reaching Haynes show
that the public has suddenly begun
to take advantage of an interpreta-
tion of the Volstead act, made more
than a year ago, which allows the
manufacture of 200 gallons of wine a
year for personal use.

A deluge of applications for per-
mits under the ruling shows that
home wine making is on the in-
crease, prohibition officials admit.
Under present interpretations of the
Volstead act, it is difficult to
refuse the permits. A review of the
decision might plug up this leak,
however.

Scotti and Gentle Win Big Honors on Double Opera Bill

Four days of grand opera at the
Metropolitan theatre came to a close
last night with the double bill of
"L'Oracolo" and "La Navarraise."

Scotti's characterization of the
cruel Scarpa, in "Tosca," has be-
come world-famed. Last evening, as
Chim-Fang, an opium den keeper, he
was again given an opportunity to
depict the villain. Considered one
of the greatest singing actors now
on the stage, his portrayal of the
snaking, round-shouldered old Chi-
naman, with trembling hands and
cunning leer, all indications of the
opium victim, was given as only the
master, Scotti, could give it. Aside
from his acting, Scotti has a bar-
itone voice of good quality.

Leon Rother, leading basso of the
Metropolitan, who is considered a
character actor of exceptional abil-

ity, as Win-Shee, a learned doctor,
showed his excellent voice to advan-
tage. Louis d'Angelo, as Hoo-Tsin,
a wealthy merchant; Henrietta
Waldfield, as Hoo-Quoo, Hoo-Chee's
nurse, and Giordano Palmirini, as
a fortune teller, all shared honors
alike. Mario Chamlee, as Win-San-
Lay, Win-Shee's son, won merited
applause. He has a delightful tenor
voice, and his personality is such
that he has been most successful in
every role he has undertaken. Anne
Roselle, as Ah-Yoo, Hoo-Tsin's niece,
revealed a pleasing soprano voice.

Alice Gentle, as "Tosca" and "Car-
men," was superb, but as Anita, in
"La Navarraise," she attained per-
fection. Not only was her singing
exquisite, her tone clear and pow-
erful, but her acting was such that
she held her audience spellbound.


"The bank never seemed to miss


