CHASES SISTER AND CUTS SELF

Arouses Neighborhood and Lands in Hospital

BOSTON, Sept. 15.—Joseph Reich of 5 Second st., East Cambridge, is in the city hospital suffering from a deep gash in his left arm inflicted by himself when he wildly swung a butcher knife in a melee at the home of his sister, Mrs. John Lathers, 57 Belvidere st.

According to Mrs. Lathers, her brother came to visit her and her husband yesterday afternoon. Mrs. Lathers said that she intended going out last night with a girl friend and her brother objected. It was then, she said, that her brother started after her with a knife.

Boy, 16, Helps to Round Up Bandits

George Harris, the 16-year-old boy virtually kidnaped from Portland by King county deputies early in the week, is said to have given the greatest bit of information which led to the capture of the three alleged bank robbers Wednesday night.

Harris, a bell boy at a Portland hotel, was known to possess inside information on the two Portland women with whom "Buddy" Ryan, one of the suspects, was believed to associate. Other information given by the boy when placed in the King county jail assisted the sheriff and his deputies and Deputy Prosecuting Attorney John D. Carmody to track the bandits in Seattle Wednesday. The two Portland women with one other from Tacoma will be summoned as witnesses at the time of the trial.
