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Senior Soccer Team Pilots Meet Tuesday

Odd Number of Teams in Division and Even Number Wanted; Schedule Not Yet Ready; Registration Lists Due Wednesday

MANAGERS of the five senior teams in The Star Soccer league will be asked to meet at The Star Tuesday night at 7 p. m.

There are five teams entered at present and the meeting is called to work out plans for the playing of an even number of teams, so no team will be forced to be idle.

Entries for the junior division have been closed with 10 teams entered altogether.

The schedule for the juniors is being made up and won't be ready for publication for a few days yet.

It was planned to have it ready for today, but it has not been finished.

The senior schedule won't be drawn up until after Tuesday's meeting.

All managers want to remember to have their registration lists ready for The Star not later than 4 p. m. Wednesday night.

Fifteen players must be signed up. Registrations must consist of all players' names and addresses with the juniors including the date of birth of each player.

These lists are to be signed by the manager of the team, with his telephone number and the name of the club's home field.

Changes in these registration lists may be made during his first half of the season in both divisions.

Changes must be made three days before any game is written. No club may carry more than 15 men, so the men are added the same number must be dropped.

HOW FAR WILL DON STEIN, Clark Speirs and Lee Stoll get in the national amateur golf championship?

This question has been asked many times in local golfing circles since it became known that these three crack Seattle linksmen would compete in the blue ribbon event which begins at St. Louis today, and as our guess may be as close as anybody's, we venture to say that Seattle will be represented in the semi-finals and that a player from the Northwest will appear in the finals.

Pooler Makes Record

Portlander Secures Three Homers Friday; Beavers Wallop Tribe Twice

IM POOLE, the hard-hitting first sacker of the Portland Beavers, hung up a "Babe" Ruth mark for the local apple orchard Friday afternoon when he hoisted three home runs over the right field barricade in the double bill with the Indians.

And his three blows were mighty big factors in the double defeat handed the tribe by the lowly Beavers, the visitors winning 6-3 and 5-1.

He drove in four runs altogether with his four nifty swats, also collected two singles, reached first once on an error and was walked purposely once during the matinee.

Pooler's first home run wallop was registered in the second inning of the first game, the big Portlander poling the onion over the Cadillac sign in deep right center, one of the longest homers of the season here. "Stubby" Mack was the second victim. Pooler slammed the pill out of sight in the second inning of the second game.

He also homed off Guy Cooper in the ninth, driving in Cox ahead of him.

POOLER BROKE O'CONNELL RECORD The former record for home run hitting at the Seattle park was held by Jim O'Connell, the hard-hitting San Francisco first sacker. Jim rapped two circuit blows over the right field partition in the opening game of the San Francisco-Seattle series here earlier in the season.

Three home runs in one day is quite a feat on any field, but there aren't so many homers poked over the Seattle fences, which makes it more remarkable.
