

RUSSIAN FAMINE TO COME AGAIN

Kamenoff Predicts Worse Time Next Year

MOSCOW, Sept. 24.—Russia faces another famine—which will come next year and will reap death among the poor of the provinces with even more swiftness than it did this year. This was the prophecy of M. Kamenoff, the soviet director of famine relief, expressed in an exclusive interview with the United Press today. Kamenoff declared the farmers had been unable to obtain sufficient seed for autumn planting. "The 1929 harvest was entirely consumed by the middle of October. Thereafter the Volga district gave absolutely nothing. Everything we ate had to be imported from the other provinces of Russia where the harvests were only 45 per cent normal," he declared.

GOLD DISCOVERY SURPASSES '49

Biggest Strike in History of California Made

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Sept. 24.—What Smith Emery & Co., leading assay firm of Southern California, predicts as the greatest gold strike in the history of the state, surpassing even the great days of '49, has been discovered in the Santa Monica mountains. The discovery was made a year ago by Dr. W. T. Covington and Nick Everett, two Los Angeles men seeking oil. The year has been spent in constant assays of the ore and surveys of the great vein itself. All activities have been guarded in deepest secrecy until the final assay report was made today and its findings disclosed to the United Press. The ore averages \$59.95 a ton, this report says. There are said to be millions of tons "in sight" along the vein, which stretches thru the Santa Monica mountains for three miles, varying in width from 25 yards to 24,000 yards.

SEEKING JOBS FOR MILLIONS

Harding Conference to Open Monday

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.—The hope of the administration is that a nationwide voluntary organization to provide work for the millions of men now jobless, will result from President Harding's unemployment conference, which will open here Monday. Secretary of Commerce Hoover will show the delegates the imperative need for prompt action to relieve the situation. Just as he did during the war when a food shortage threatened the world, Hoover will appeal to the patriotism of the country for the establishment of an unemployment organization. Governors, mayors, leading employers and representatives of labor in all parts of the country will be asked to form the voluntary organization. Activities probably will be directed by the United States employment service which it is hoped to put on a working basis. President Harding, who will open the conference, will urge the need for voluntary co-operation to make a big decrease in unemployment before winter comes and the hope of the administration is that the conference will so focus the attention of the country on the need for prompt action that the new organization can be established. Conference officials are expected to suggest to the delegates the following possibilities as offering hope of stimulating employment: 1—Construction of school houses and other public buildings. 2—Resumption of home building on a large scale. 3—Expansion of waterworks, electric lighting plants, street railways and other public utilities, especially where municipally owned. 4—Road building. 5—Development of irrigation projects. 6—Revival of the textile and other basic industries.


