Fanny, the sister, grows to womanhood, also scripping and saving for the genius of the family. The unfairness of this to Fanny causes the mother many tears and finally her death.

Fanny leaves Winnebago to make her way to Chicago. She finds a job. Her employer has experienced a loveless marriage. Consequently he falls in love with Fanny. She is about to quit her position because of that when her brother arrives from Europe with his little daughter. His wife had deserted him.

Fanny's employer enables the brother to become a concert success. On the eve of his tour, the brother leaves Fanny to return to his worthless wife.

Then Fanny declares she will live for Fanny herself thereafter. No one else matters.

Just what happens then brings the picture to a pleasing climax.

Alice Terry, who plays the young wife, is exquisite. She makes you feel the awakening of a soul in the dainty butterfly who sacrificed herself to care for her husband blinded in battle.

COLISEUM
 The director did his best to make the film version of "Cappy Ricks," from Peter S. Kyne's stories, now showing at the Coliseum, a starring vehicle for Thomas Meighan.

But the story was greater than the director, for Cappy Ricks is the outstanding figure of the picture. And that's as Kyne had things in his stories.
