MYSTERY MAN MISSING MATE

Many Women Say They Were Wed to Him

ASHEVILLE, N. C., Oct. 7.—Who was the "Man of Mystery" who died recently at a hospital in Weaverville, N. C.?

More than 150 women, from all parts of the country, are anxious to know.

Which one, or ones, if any, had he married in the past and then deserted?

The "Man of Mystery" drifted into Asheville a few months ago. He was a patient at several hospitals, and then his money ran out and he was sent to a Weaverville institution.

After his death a grip was found in which were letters and passports bearing these names: J. R. Harrison, K. L. Carson, Edward Alfred Mangle, Edward Alfred Cohen and Charles Moyno. This list was published.

Then letters from women, all over the country, started pouring in on Attorney J. Scrup Styles, of Asheville, asking information about the stranger.

Many of them related instances of short romances—and the disappearance of their husbands. "Was the 'Man of Mystery' the missing mate?"

Many of those who have written have indicated that their only interest is to determine whether their missing husband is dead, so they can marry again.

In the meantime the estate of the stranger will be held open for a year, during which time all claimants will be given a chance to file their claim to widowhood and the opportunity to attempt to prove the same.

Trackless Trolley Beats Street Cars Will Run by Gasoline or Electricity

Mayor Hylan of New York Says It is the Nearest Approach to the Solution of the City's Transportation Problem



Mayor Hylan of New York says the above trolley bus, which adapts itself to either gas or electrical propulsion, is the nearest approach to the solution of the city's transportation problem of anything he has seen to date. Detroit is also adopting this gas-electric unit, which may be used either as a gasoline propelled bus or an electrical trackless trolley.

"Being stepless and conforming to the accepted height of 29 inches," adds Grover Whalen, commissioner of plants and structures for New York city, "this omnibus is unique. It answers a long-felt need in city transportation."

The city of Detroit has adopted this type of bus and issued specifications for the building of a large number. A strong feature of this bus is that it can, with little cost, be transformed from a gasoline unit to an electrically driven, fast, safe, trackless surface car.

KEEP YOUR EYE ON SPARE TIRES

Savage Tire and Rubber Co. Gives Advice

"Why do people fasten a spare tire on the back of their cars and then forget about it?" asks the Savage Tire and Rubber Co. "The extra tire is just as important as the ones on the wheels, and should be cared for just as much. When you use the spare, don't forget to pump it up, see that it is in good shape and ready to run."

According to the Savage people, it is a mistake to fasten the tire to the back of the machine with the intention of using it only in case of emergency. A prolonged period of idleness will harden a tire on the surface and deteriorate it so that when it is put into service, the tread wears off rapidly.

The best plan is to change about with one of the others tires. Keep them all constantly in use, and the extra work of changing will be greatly repaid in extra mileage.
