

FOCH ARRIVES HERE NOV. 30

Final Plans Being Made for His Reception

Final plans for the entertainment of Marshal Foch and his staff will be completed Monday or Tuesday, when Lieut. Gov. Coyle, head of the American Legion's state reception committee, arrives in Seattle from Washington, D. C.

Marshal Foch and his party will arrive in Seattle at 9:30 or 10 a. m., November 30, over the Milwaukee railroad, according to Gen. H. Haynes, general passenger agent. The party will be accompanied by representatives of the federal government and of the American Legion. Arrangements have been made whereby the party will leave Spokane at midnight, November 29, thus enabling them to pass thru the Cascades by daylight on the morning of November 30.

A civic reception and celebration in the marshal's honor will be held in Seattle on the day of his arrival, according to Henry A. Wise, state adjutant of the American Legion. It is expected that the day of December 1 will be passed quietly by Marshal Foch, preparatory to his trip down the Pacific coast. If this plan is followed he will deny himself to visitors the second day of his stay here, said Wise.


McAdoo Is Invited Here for Banquet




Last Day for Tax Payments Nov. 30

CHANCE OF N. W. FOR RUSS TRADE

The Pacific Northwest should investigate Russian problems in order to get in on the ground floor in trade with that country, was a fundamental point in the message presented Seattle business men at a luncheon at Meves' cafeteria this noon by M. Alexander Schwartz, author and lecturer. Mr. Schwartz spoke on "What Bolshevism Means to Civilization."

Russia is going to regain her financial and political footing again, and when that time comes commercial opportunities will be many, he went on to say. Mr. Schwartz spoke under the general auspices of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce, Foreign Trade Bureau, China Club and Associated Industries. He spent many years in Russia, traveling there since the war. He has credentials from Assistant Secretary of the Navy Theodore Roosevelt, Secretary of Commerce Herbert Hoover, and Washington's secretary of state, J. Grant Hinkle.
