

NEW WORLD MEETING ON IN ENGLAND

Sound Currency Association Plans to Get Back to Gold

LONDON, Nov. 25.—While the disarmament conference at Washington is still in session, another great international conference will open here in London, December 6, to tackle another angle—the money angle—of world problems.

The Sound Currency Association, which has called for a great international monetary conference, on December 6 and 7, was formed for the primary purpose of restoring Great Britain to a gold basis in its currency and to cut out the flood of paper money.

SESSIONS TO BE HELD AT MANSION HOUSE

The sessions will be held in the historic Mansion House, the offices of the lord mayor of old London.

The first meeting will be called to order by the lord mayor, and Earl Beauchamp, president of the Sound Currency Association, will be the first chairman.

Invitations have been sent out to all the leading nations of the world. Most of them have responded favorably. France, Italy, Greece and Mexico are sending official government delegates.

Other countries, notably Norway, Denmark, Sweden, China, Japan, the United States, Austria and Holland are sending delegates who will represent not their governments, but great banking associations.

A significant exception is Germany. The Central Association of German Banks and Banking Industry refused to send delegates because it thought such a conference would be a step toward a new world government.

This has caused a storm of criticism in Germany, and unless something prevents, Germany will be represented by the American delegation, Walter Rathenau, recently minister of reconstruction.

Other prominent men expected to attend are Prof. Irving Fisher of Yale university, Dr. Ludwig von Mises and Prof. Schumpeter of Austria, George Raphael Levi, member of the French senate; Dr. Gianni of Italy; Miguel Covarrubias, official representative of the Mexican government.

OTHER AMERICANS EXPECTED AT MEETING

The secretary of state for India has officially designated H. F. Howland, controller of finance, and C. H. Klumb, financial secretary, to represent India. The International Chamber of Commerce is sending three delegates and the great British National Union of Merchants and Manufacturers has nominated Lord Cowdry and Lord Emmott, two of the biggest business men of Great Britain.

Besides Prof. Fisher, other Americans are expected.

The momentous subjects to be discussed will be the deflation of national currencies; methods designed to rehabilitate currencies and restore the gold basis; international loans, credits, debts, reparations; international exchange and the depreciation of currencies in the money markets of the world; inflation as a factor in the unemployment crisis which is afflicting almost the whole world.

NOT DIVORCE THAT DESTROYS FAMILY

"It isn't divorce that strikes at the heart of the family and society as much as the fact that boys and girls are brought up with no sense of responsibility toward life.

"Every woman should understand home-making and housekeeping. Even the she never has to work. I have no intention of slaving as a cook or a scullery maid—yet I could do either.

"Girls should understand home economics not only for marriage but for themselves if they remain single. It isn't enough to give them a side course at school in domestic science. They should be trained to the fullest responsibility of life as housewife and mother."

NO RESTRAINT WHERE IT'S MOST NEEDED

"And regarding American children—

"There's no restraint on them when they most need it. There's nothing else in the world that doesn't have its season except the American child—it bursts into bloom constantly and prematurely.

"The less you give a child, the greater the thrill of possession—the fuller later life will be. But the American child has and knows everything."
