
The membership of the Tillamooks is expected to be about 150. Accommodations for 29 men to live in the house are being arranged. The remainder of the building will be designed for social recreation.

Prepared to advocate a scheme whereby carfare in Seattle may be reduced in a short time to 5 cents, Professor F. D. Hayden, of the department of civil engineering, in the University of Washington, has resigned his position at the university to file for city councilman.

Professor Hayden's street car plan is to be explained in a series of articles beginning next week. "I feel," he said, "that as a councilman I may make good use of the results of my close study of public utilities for the benefit of the city."
