MAKES PLEA FOR CONVICT LABOR
 Superintendent of Prison Argues Before Chamber

Development of manufacturing industries, including that of auto license plates, to a high degree within the walls of the state penal institutions, was urged by John Pace, newly appointed superintendent of the state prison at Walla Walla, speaking at the Seattle hotel, Thursday, before the executive committee of the Chamber of Commerce Northwest Products bureau.

Pace maintained that this would result in lowering the tax burden and would enable persons committed to prison to come out and to take a helpful place in society.

SAYS MONEY IS NEEDED
 "With the proposed repeal of the poll tax and some other measures," Pace said, "the taxes of this state will be increased 5 or 6 mills—if these measures are repealed. It costs 75 cents a day for each prisoner in the state penitentiary. Salaries have been cut until guards are getting as low as \$75 a month. There is no way left in which the maintenance costs may be reduced. "Only one thing remains, and that is to place as many of the inmates as possible on a self-sustaining basis. This will take the burden off the people and will result in a material reduction in taxes."

"But, even more important than the financial consideration, in my estimation at least, is the welfare of the prisoner and the character of person we turn loose on society at the end of his term. Under the present system we give a man a suit of clothes and \$5 in money when he is released. He hasn't learned a trade, or the habit of industry, and in these times, especially, can't get a job. So, when his \$5 is gone he commits another crime and we get him back again—meaning another 75 cents a day plus the cost of conviction for the harassed taxpayer."

"At the Washington state penitentiary we have to furnish everything—literally everything—for 7,000 persons. Just imagine what that means. Wages for guards, medical attendants, and so on, cannot be reduced further. But, if we can manufacture something that will bring in a revenue and at the same time teach the inmates some useful occupation and instill into them the habit of industry, the cost of maintenance will be reduced and real good accomplished."

Pace cited the Minnesota state prison, where, he said, a \$3,000,000 binding twine mill was established, and has now more than repaid its initial cost and maintenance. Inmates are paid \$1.50 a day, part of which goes to their families where there are families. When a man is released, he finds that, due to the activities of the parole officers, his family is intact, his children in school, and he is able to take his place as a useful citizen.
