## Coast League Clubs to Cut Down Their Squads

Teams Probably Will Carry Three Catchers, Eight Pitchers, Five Infielders and Four Outfielders Through the Regular Season

ALTER McCREDIE, chief of the Seattle Indians, must use the pruning knife between now and Monday, when the 20-man player limit for the Coast league goes into effect. Chances are that the team will carry three catchers, eight pitchers, four outfielders and five infielders for the season.

Eight pitchers are needed because of the big run of double-headers usually in vogue in the Coast league.

Jack Adams, Tub Spencer and Frank Tobin are almost all sure to stick as they were carried last year, and Adams is now on the shelf with broken ribs.

Of the pitchers Elmer Jacobs, Harry Gardner, Joe Dailey, Vean Gregg and Ernie Schorr are all considered regulars.

From Joe Finneman, Stubby Mack, Lefty Burger and Arthur Henke, McCredie must pick three to round out the staff.

Sombody will be out of a job when McCredie names his infield. Rod Murphy and Manuel Cuelo are fixtures on the corners of the diamond. Spencer Adams has won a home at second base with his great work in the Oakland series.

This leaves Bill Stumpf, Tex Wisterill and Tom Connolly for the other job. It's not likely that more than two of this trio will be kept, although three may be retained and seven pitchers carried.

Billy Lana, Brick Eldred, Frank Schulte and Ed Barney are all fixtures in the outfield. The former three are now the regulars and they're all playing good ball. Barney has done such wonderful pinch hitting that he's bound to be kept.

The rest of the recruits retained by the Indians during the early weeks of the season have all been farmed out. Bell, May and Ritchie have been sent to Vancouver, while Brovold has gone home with an injured shoulder.

**PITCHERS PUT VERNON IN RACE**  
A corking good pitching staff is keeping the Vernon Tigers up in the Coast league race. Right now Jackie May, the Texas lefthander, is the star of the outfit. Bill James shows promise of becoming a winner, while Tony Faeh and Frank Schellenback are both good deceivers. And when Wheeler Dell gets back in the game he will add another good pitcher to the list. The Tigers are not serious, but they're smart and good defensive players, with fair attack. They bear watching.
