He was an American inventor (1852-1909, born in Dover, N. Y. In 1881 he prepared a model of a revolving battery which he submitted to the military authorities in Washington and from which he subsequently developed a metallic revolving fort to be used on land and water, and for this in 1883 he obtained a patent for a revolving tower for defensive and offensive warfare. In consequence of this patent he received a royalty of \$1,000 in 1883 for each turret constructed by the builders of the Monitor.

What is the largest passenger lake steamer of the United States? The "Secandee," which has a capacity of 6,251 tons.

What is the standard bushel of the United States? The Winchester bushel, which contains 2,150.42 cubic inches.

What is the Fata Morgana? A striking kind of mirage observed in the Strait of Messina and elsewhere in Italy. A spectator on the shore sees images of men, houses, ships, etc., sometimes in the water, sometimes in the air—the same object having frequently two images, one inverted.

## Make Your Budget for Family Garden

How do you know how large a garden to plant?

"Don't just put in two rows of peas and one of corn," says Miss Edna E. Walker, county home demonstration agent, "but make out a budget so you will know just the quantity of each vegetable and fruit you are going to need and thus avoid over or under planting, when laying out the family garden."

An outline for a family food preservation budget has just been received by Miss Walker from the extension service of the state college at Pullman.

In making out the budget, it is recommended that it be based on the following allowance for each person in the family:

Vegetables, other than potatoes or dried beans, two servings daily; include at least two servings a week of green leafy vegetables and two tomatoes.

Fruits, two servings daily. Include oranges or citrus fruits at least once a week, if practicable.

It is suggested that eggs be served at least every other day for children, and more if possible.

It is urged that under ordinary conditions not more than half of the required supplies of fruits and vegetables be canned, and that the balance be made up from winter vegetables and fruits that may be stored in the home or purchased fresh in the market, and also that liberal use be made of dried fruits.

## 3 Little Eggs; 3 Little Birds and 600 Children

Three little robins with bulging eyes and gaping beaks over their peaceful existence this week to the 600 youngsters at Gatewood school.

Three weeks ago one little 10-year-old discovered something as he stood on his tip-toes and looked into a round nest of twigs and moss resting in the shrubbery near the front door of the school.

"A blue egg," he whispered to a playmate, "a blue egg with speckles."

Within one day the whole school knew about the blue egg. Six hundred youngsters had stood on tip-toes, so quietly, had seen the speckled treasure. Some even had seen a mother robin.

Yet something had to be done—for protection. So the whole school organized. Six hundred youngsters decided to protect the blue egg.

Each "room," of which there are

16 in the school, was to take its turn standing guard. Of course, the whole room wouldn't act together, but committees from each would be appointed to serve at different hours of the day—during recess and noon and so on. It was indeed a wonderful honor to be on the "birdnest committee."

In just a day or so the youngsters were rewarded by the appearance of two more speckled eggs. The school was a flutter of excitement and thrills. Yet voices were soft and hushed near the shrubbery at the school entrance. Weren't there three eggs and a mother robin in the nest? And weren't there going to be three—?

There were. For just about one week ago some one almost forgot to whisper and nearly squealed with joy when peering into the nest. Three funny, scrawny, squirming
