HOW MEMORIAL DAY ORIGINATED



COLUMBUS, Ga., May 30.—To the women of Columbus, Ga., belongs the honor of having conceived Memorial day as we know it today.

Charleston, S. C., had previously held a form of memorial exercise on May 1, 1865, consisting of dedication ceremonies of the ground where 237 Union soldiers were buried.

There were no festivities in connection with the first Memorial day in Columbus. This was a day of "sad memories."

From 1861 to the end of the war Columbus had a Ladies' Aid society, its purpose being to care for soldiers, ill or wounded, who might come home or who could be reached in the field.

The duty of devotion finished, Miss Rutherford and Mrs. Martin discussed the significance of the work they had been doing in the cemetery.

"Let us continue the Ladies' Aid society for work of this character," said Miss Rutherford.

Within a few days, in January of 1868, she called a meeting of the society at the home of Mrs. John Tyler.

The house still stands. Those present were Mrs. Robert Carter, president; Mrs. I. A. Ware, Mrs. William G. Woodfolk, Mrs. Clara M. Dexter, Mrs. J. M. McAllister and Mrs. Charles J. Williams.

She selected April 26, giving two reasons: First, that it was a day of sad memories, the date upon which Gen. Joseph E. Johnston surrendered his army to the Federal, an act that sealed the fate of the Confederacy; second, it was a date when flowers would be plentiful.

Deaths had claimed all the women who attended the January meeting. There is one person alive, however, who has personal knowledge of the gathering. She is Mrs. M. E. Gray, daughter of Mrs. Tyler.

TACOMA, May 30.—In a spectacular blaze, fanned by a strong south-east wind, the new plant of the Peterman Manufacturing company, one of the pioneer woodworking establishments of Tacoma, was totally destroyed last night, entailing a loss estimated at \$150,000, fully covered by insurance.

Damage estimated at \$45,000 was also suffered by the Tacoma Railway & Power company and the Puget Sound Electric company thru the destruction of a transformer house and damage to the Tacoma-Seattle Interurban bridge.

MATHILDE WILL FIGHT FOR LOVE

Court Battle Between Her Parents Balks Romance

CHICAGO, May 30.—Mathilde McCormick, 17-year-old granddaughter of John D. Rockefeller, came back to Chicago today to fight for the right to wed Max Oser, Swiss groom.

The girl was to have sailed for Europe at midnight, but returned from New York unexpectedly, presumably to side with her father in the court battle over her guardianship, which starts tomorrow.

Harold F. McCormick, multi-millionaire head of the International Harvester Co., who was divorced by Mrs. McCormick, had himself appointed the girl's guardian a week ago.

Friends said the move was taken because Swiss laws prohibit a minor to marry without the consent of her parents or guardian. McCormick has been favorable to the marriage of the girl to Oser, while the mother was bitterly opposed to it.

Mrs. McCormick tomorrow will plead in justice court for a reproof of the proceedings following which McCormick was named Mathilde's guardian. Her contention will be that she was not properly notified of the court hearing a week ago.

10 Cents Fine for Bathing Suits

HONOLULU, May 30.—It costs 10 cents in a court fine to walk the streets of Honolulu in a bathing suit.

This is the sum settled upon by Judge J. B. Lightfoot as a fine for violators of the Desha bathing suit law, which forbids bathers going from their homes to the beach at Waikiki, without wearing a "suitable outer garment."

Judge Lightfoot declared the law absurd, and the city prosecutor agreed with him. But as the law must be upheld, a fine of 10 cents, with court costs remitted, was decided upon for the men with handsome figures and the women with shapely forms, who parade to the beach in one-piece suits, sans overcoats, bathrobe, kimono, etc.

Now the estate goes to Harry and his mother.

According to the information contained in the telegram, the estate comprises \$750,000 in cash, \$125,000 in bonds of a tobacco company, and the remainder in real estate which is located in North Carolina.

Sell Eight \$1 Bills for \$1; Land in Jail

OKMULGEE, Okla., May 30.—An alleged confidence game, in which three men are charged with having offered \$1 bills for sale at the rate of 12 1/2 cents each, finding a lively market, but failing to deliver the cheap money after they had received their price, was uncovered here with the arrest of "Jack" Gardner of Muskogee on charges of fraud and robbery.
