Good Old-Fashioned Doughnuts and Crullers The Kind you can only get at Home

DOUGHNUTS 1/2 cup Kingsford's Corn Starch 1 teaspoon Salt 4 teaspoons Baking Powder 1/4 cup Karo 1/2 cup Milk 1/2 cup Sugar Flour 2 Eggs 3 tablespoons Mazola 1 teaspoon Vanilla Sift dry ingredients. If desired substitute one cup rye flour and add one and a half squares melted chocolate for chocolate crullers.

Mother Opposing Mathilde Romance

CHICAGO, May 31.—Mrs. Edith Rockefeller McCormick today went on record opposing the marriage of her daughter, Mathilde, 17, to Max Oser, Swiss livery stable proprietor. The daughter of the world's richest man, in a prepared statement to be placed on the records of the probate court, announced that while she would not further protest appointment of her divorced husband, Harold F. McCormick, as guardian of the old Mathilde, she desired to have her stand against the proposed marriage in the court records.

It is understood the Rockefellers have threatened to cut Mathilde's inheritance if she pursues her intention of marrying Oser.

Another reason for Mrs. McCormick's formal statement was her hope that the probate court, which has jurisdiction of the guardianship proceedings, might take cognizance of the marriage and take steps to prevent its taking place. This is the first time Mrs. McCormick has publicly opposed the marriage.
