

# TEAR BOMBS ARE USED TO THWART MOB

## Ex-Convict Admits Brutal Murder of Girl; Is Saved From Lynching.

JACKSON, Mich., June 14.—A mob of 2,000, attempting to storm the Jackson jail and get possession of George Straub, an ex-convict, who confessed murdering Miss Alice Mallett, was dispersed early today by tear bombs hurled into the crowd by deputies.

Miss Mallett, matron of the Crittenden home, was found brutally slain and her body mutilated with an ax on June 9.

Straub, an ex-convict, and regarded as mentally subnormal, was under suspicion from the first. A complete confession was made public early last night.

The streets were soon filled with hundreds of persons weeping about and talking mob violence.

The murmuring, threatening crowds soon started to gravitate toward the jail and demands for vengeance became louder.

Hundreds of women and children were in the crowd. Many women took the lead in demanding the confessed slayer's life.

The crowd surged forward to the jail steps and Sheriff George Larned ordered deputies to throw in the gas bombs from second floor windows. The crowd, angrily defiant, was forced to give way.

In the respite, Straub, heavily shackled, was taken from a rear entrance and whisked away in an automobile to a neighboring town.

As the crowd drove forward a second time, deputies announced Straub was no longer in jail. When the mob refused to believe that he had been taken away, a committee was appointed and searched the jail.

# TAYLOR RECALL UP TO LEGION

## Dr. Kelton to Sound All Posts on Proposition

Preparations were being made Wednesday by Dr. Walter S. The recall movement is based on campaign statements by Taylor in which he expressed opposition to any reduction in school salaries.

Taylor defends his vote on the ground that, while he wanted no pay-out, it was the only means by which the school district could stay within its income.

Meanwhile, a committee of teachers is preparing to go before the school board to urge reconsideration of the reduction. This committee comprises Worth McKay, J. M. Kalesley and D. O. Richardson. # SEN. LA FOLLETTE SCORES HIGH COURT

OHIO NATIONAL GUARD ARMORY, Cincinnati, June 14.—Asserting that the supreme court of the United States is now "the actual ruler of the American people," Senator La Follette in a speech to the American Federation of Labor convention, today proposed a constitutional amendment giving congress the right to nullify any decision of the high tribunal knocking out a law, by re-enacting the measure.

The court, the senator declared, has assumed powers over the laws and public policies of the country which the framers of the constitution never intended it should have.

"I believe this question of judicial usurpation is now the supreme issue," La Follette declared. La Follette indicated that he would seek to enlist the support of the progressives, the farmer and the labor forces for his amendment.

He claimed it was in accordance with the Rooseveltian principle of 1912 for the recall of judges' decisions. Popular election of federal judges, a plan long advocated by organized labor, will not remedy the situation, he said. La Follette also proposed that no federal judge, except those on the supreme bench, be allowed to declare a law unconstitutional. He denounced the court bitterly for its decision that the child labor laws were unconstitutional and for its recent holdings in the Colorado case, that labor unions can be sued for damages.

La Follette said:

"By a gradual encroachment, sovereignty has been wrested from the people and usurped by the courts.

"Today the actual ruler of the American people is the supreme court of the United States. The law is what they say it is and not what the people, thru congress, enact. In fact, five of these men are actually the supreme rulers, for by a bare majority the court has repeatedly overridden the will of the people as declared by their representatives in congress and has construed the legislation to mean whatever suited their peculiar economic and political views."

La Follette turned his fire sharply on Chief Justice Taft, stating he had been repudiated by the voters of the United States on his record.

# HOPE TO END CHILD LABOR

## A. F. of L. Will Appeal to Mother Love

OHIO NATIONAL GUARD ARMORY, Cincinnati, June 14.—The mother love of America is to be organized by the American Federation of Labor to put an end to child labor.

In a great two-sided plan, which was inaugurated here today in the federation's convention, organized labor will appeal particularly to the nation's mothers for their votes in accomplishing the double objective of the foes of child labor. The two objectives are:

1. Enactment in every state of laws prohibiting employment of children, with drastic penalties for violation.

2. Amendment of the federal constitution to permit congress to enact a federal child labor law, which the supreme court says congress cannot now enact without infringing upon the constitutional sovereignty of the separate states.

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# R. OLMSTEAD TAKEN IN BIG WHISKY RAID!

## Accused as Chief of Huge Gang of Smugglers; Freed on \$1,000 Bail.

Accused as the head of the Northwest's greatest rum smuggling ring, former Police Lieut. Roy Olmstead was at liberty on \$1,000 bail Wednesday. Olmstead was captured by federal prohibition agents Tuesday night, after a seizure of whisky and liquors valued at \$20,000 at the home of Eddie Gay, 2631 W. Holden st.

Olmstead, according to Prohibition Director Roy Lyle, is commander-in-chief of the booze ring of which former Patrolman Thomas J. Clark and three companions are alleged to be members. Clark and the other men are held in Los Angeles, charged with smuggling whisky from Vancouver, B. C., marked as "household goods."

The booze seizure Tuesday was made after federal agents had trailed the huge booze consignment to the W. Holden at house. They surrounded the place and arrested Gay. They found 50 cases of bonded whisky in the cellar, they said.

Gay was taken to the federal prohibition headquarters and questioned. A guard was put on the house. While the guard walked to and fro, agents of the whisky gang entered the cellar and rapidly disposed of the stock. When federal agents arrived for the second time they found the whisky had disappeared, with the exception of five cases.

A search of the premises revealed 550 bottles of booze in the tall grass near the back fence, where they had been thrown.

Gay was grilled, and upon his story federal agents arrested Olmstead shortly after, while he was walking on the street. A warrant was issued for Lou Gillam, charging him with possession of liquor.

Olmstead and Clark are alleged to have operated the motor launch Zambezi between Seattle and Vancouver, smuggling the booze by rail from Seattle to California points.

# TRIUMVIRATE RULES RUSSIA

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# WILL VOTE ON RAILWAY TIEUP

## Strike Ballot Is Ordered by 11 Unions

CHICAGO, June 14.—Executives of 11 large railroad unions have been authorized to order a strike by vote of their 1,200,000 members.

Information in railroad union circles here was that more than 90 per cent of the vote canvassed favored a strike.

Balloting started Sunday and the official canvass is expected to be completed in time to order the walkout for July 1 or July 15, if the union heads desire to make use of the strike vote at that time.

The vote was taken on three propositions:

1. Whether wage reductions would be accepted, as have been ordered or expected from the United States railroad labor board.
2. Whether the unions would consent to "farming out" of shop work to contractors to escape rulings of the railroad board.
3. Whether unions will accept the revised working rules as set forth by the labor board.

Most of the unions which are balloting are connected with the railroad department of the American Federation of Labor. The largest single group is the shop men, with approximately 500,000 members.

# KILLER OF TWO SHOT BY POSSE

## Rancher Terrorizes Whole Neighborhood

ORIN JUNCTION, Wyo., June 14.—Two persons were slain, three wounded and an entire neighborhood terrorized near here yesterday when T. E. Tubb, farmer, ran amuck with a revolver. Tubb, a homesteader, called authorities here to a general store near his ranch, complaining that his ranch was being taken from him.

Deputy Sheriff John McPherson went to the store and was shot by Tubb. Those in the store fled except Tubb's wife, S. S. Magnuson, station agent, was shot and wounded as he passed the store. J. A. Graham, rancher, also fell seriously wounded. Tubb then killed his wife.

A posse surrounded the store and, when Tubb refused to surrender, riddled the building with bullets. They found the slayer dead.
