

BRIDEGROOM ARRESTED AT WEDDING ALTAR

CLEVELAND, June 14.—The strains of Lohengrin's wedding march—
The smiling bridal couple coming down the aisle—
Showers of rice and confetti—
"You are wanted at headquarters—we have a warrant for your arrest!" And detectives step forward to lay their hands on the shoulders of the bridegroom.

As they leave the church, a woman tears her hat from her head, disclosing lacerations and bandages.
"See what you did! See what you did!" she shrieks.

Thus ended the wedding here of Clark Fogerty and Miss Dorothy Fluck, both of Lakewood, a suburb of this city.

Fogerty is charged with having attacked Mrs. Peggy Emanuel, the woman who upbraided him as the bride. Mrs. Emanuel was beaten over the head with a revolver in her home. The attack was made in an effort to obtain valuable diamonds belonging to Mrs. Emanuel, detectives believe.

"I was desperate. I needed the money—I had to have it," police say Fogerty confessed when taken to the station.

Money to pay for the furnishings in the little Lakewood home where he and his bride were to live? Fear that lack of money might halt the wedding!

"I will stand by Clark," his bride declares. "I cannot believe he did this thing while in his right mind. He must have been crazy thru worry." And then she tells of how he was wounded and gassed overseas. "Might it not be that?" she asks.

Draft Evader's Agent Released
PORTLAND, Ore., June 14.—A. Gerald Paffenbarger, self-confessed financial agent of Grover Cleveland Bergdoll, notorious draft evader, was fined \$25 in municipal court here yesterday on charges of resisting an officer and disorderly conduct.

Paffenbarger put up a great fight when officers sought to arrest him for quizzing in regard to an advertisement he had inserted in the personal columns of daily papers asking for contributions of "45 and upwards."

He confessed he wanted the money to help Bergdoll write a history of his trouble with the United States government. Federal authorities, after grilling Paffenbarger, admitted they could find no reason to hold the man.

"Old Time Religion" Is Demand of Baptists

CADLE TABERNACLE, Indianapolis, June 14.—Conservative Baptists fought today to wrest control of the denomination from the radicals.

The breach between the two wings of the faith, which comprises 2,000,000 adherents, widened as the national convention opened here today.

"It's a finish fight," said Dr. J. C. Massee, of Boston, nationally known minister and leader of the conservatives of fundamentalists. "We're not going to wait for the pendulum to swing back to the faith of our fathers."

"We're going to pull it back." Dr. Massee leads the popularly known "hard shell" Baptists. It's not a term of derision. They take pride in the name themselves.

The leader prevented a split in the Baptist church when he induced his followers to give up plans for a bolt and to fight the battle of "the old-time religion" out on the convention floor.

The conservatives accept the Bible from Genesis to Revelations; the radicals, led by Dr. Harry Emerson Fosdyck and Dr. Frank Paderford, New York, interpret the Bible liberally, claiming certain portions of it to be allegorical.

Both sides claim 75 per cent of the denomination's constituency. Dr. Massee, however, admits the radicals are in control.

"We spent years in causing the opposition, instead of discussing them," he said. "While we were asleep they edged us out. Now we have only a 10 per cent representation on committees and boards, and the funds and properties of the church are in their hands."

Efforts to have the nominating committee announce the candidates for office 24 hours in advance of the election were made by Dr. Massee shortly after the convention opened.

"That would give us a chance to look the candidates over," he said.

2 HUSBANDS, 1 HONEYMOON

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 14.—"She was a dream and she accepted me on condition her brother could live with us."

Otto Goldschmid, auto salesman, told his matrimonial troubles in Municipal Judge Kilroy's court and admitted he thought on his honeymoon that his wife and brother were awful loving.

"I met her in Julesburg, Colo.," said Goldschmid. "We married and went to Omaha and lived, taking her brother along. One day I went away from home and when I got back the only thing the lady me of \$250 was \$5 and a note saying they had gone to Kansas City to study Shakespeare."

"Then I learned he wasn't her brother at all, but her husband."

Despite denials of Goldschmid's charges to the wife and Charles W. Martin, an actor, also the "brother," Judge Kilroy assessed a fine of \$500 against Martin.

AUTOISTS HURT IN 125 FT. DROP

Car Rolls Down Steep Bank; Six Escape Injury

Plunging over a 125-foot embankment near North Bend, on the Sunset highway, Tuesday night, an auto driven by James W. Pioe, 217 W. 112th st., rolled over a dozen times in the descent, yet only two persons of the eight occupants of the car were injured.

Mrs. Pioe was picked from the wreckage shortly after the accident. She was found to have received a broken left leg. Her husband was bruised and may have sustained internal injuries. Three children, Francis, age 2; William, 11, and Mary Louise, 9, escaped unhurt. Three other persons also were unhurt, being thrown clear of the plunging car.

Pioe and his wife were taken to Snoqualmie hospital, where their condition Wednesday was said to be improving.

No cause for the accident has been established.
