

BREAD AND PEACH PUDDING

Of Columbia University

6 slices or 12 small pieces of soft, stale bread
1 1/2 cups milk 3 eggs 1/4 cup sugar 1/4 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla 8 fresh or 1 can peaches

Butter a tin mold, as is used for steamed puddings. Beat eggs slightly, add to milk with sugar, salt and vanilla. Dip bread in the milk and line the mold with these pieces, placing a layer on the bottom of mold.

Over this place peaches, cut in quarters or eighths, adding sugar if peaches are not sweet.

Continue until material is used. Pour over all the remainder of egg and milk. Steam until custard is set.

Turn from mold and serve with any good liquid sauce or with plain or beaten cream.
