

THREE HURT IN AUTO ACCIDENTS

Injuries to Boy May Prove Fatal

Two small boys and a woman were injured, one of the boys perhaps fatally, in three separate auto accidents Wednesday night. Vernon Gundlach, 15, a school-boy, living at 1427 E. Northlake ave., is in the Seattle General hospital, critically hurt. It is feared he has a skull fracture. The boy was knocked down on East 63rd st., between 16th and 17th aves. N. E., by an auto driven by W. A. Woodbeck, 624 47th ave. N. E. The lad dodged in front of the car, making the accident unavoidable, Woodbeck claimed. Roland Blood, 10, 1600 15th ave., was struck by a car driven by Hilmar Johnson, 2632 W. 64th st., but saved himself by holding onto the fender. The boy was cut slightly about the head and was taken to his home. The accident happened at Olive st., near 15th ave. While crossing the street at 20th ave. and E. Alder st., Mrs. Robert White, 2014 E. Alder st., was knocked down and bruised by an auto driven by C. E. Williams, 7919 Beacon ave. Mrs. White is in the Providence hospital.

NO DRIVE FOR CHAMBER NOW

Waterhouse Says Promise to Be Fulfilled

Frank Waterhouse, president of the Chamber of Commerce, announced Thursday the chamber will not put on any drive or campaign for funds this fall. He said: "The chamber's increasing activities and larger responsibilities justify merit larger financial support and more funds could be advantageously used in promoting the community welfare. However, when funds were raised three years ago to make possible the national advertising campaign, the pledge was made to budget subscribers that they would not be solicited for three years. The chamber will make good this pledge. Many of the budget subscribers expire next summer and at that time present subscribers will, we are confident from their expressions, not only renew their subscriptions but increase them, and others will be obtained. "This year's national advertising for tourists brought tremendous results. The trustees, who are in a position to accurately gauge the results, have voted to continue this campaign next year. In deciding to make this appropriation, they have expressed confidence that the community will adequately support the chamber when funds are asked next summer. "The Chamber of Commerce has just pledged financial support to the campaign which is being made and is to be continued to get the great Columbia Basin project under way. This is an obligation which requires the chamber to advance \$15,500, in common with appropriations from other cities, before the end of this year. It is an obligation additional to the other financial burdens of the chamber. But here again we are not going out and soliciting funds but are going to keep the pledge that there would be no financial campaign until expiration of the three-year period, which is June, 1923. "Friends of the chamber who wish it to take on additional activities had urged a solicitation campaign, but those directing its affairs felt that aside from the matter of keeping good faith business men of the community were 'fed up' on drives and that only recently they were called upon to subscribe for hotel bonds and contribute to the community chest."

Navy Day Oct. 27; City to Celebrate
Seattle will celebrate Navy day, October 27, with fitting observance, the Chamber of Commerce, which has been asked by the navy department to sponsor the celebration, announced Wednesday. Vessels in the harbor will "dress ship." Capt. J. S. Gibson, chairman of the chamber's naval affairs committee will have a Navy day speech broadcast over radio, and the member's council luncheon of the chamber on that day will be given over to things naval.

FERRYMAN MUST THOUSANDS TO DEFEND PERJURY SEE NEW BRIDGE

Captain of Boat in Kelso Banker Case Indicted **Yakima's Delegation May Be the Largest**

Captain John Reid, master of the ferryboat Queen and principal witness in the mysterious disappearance case of Fred L. Stewart, former cashier of the Kelso State bank, was at liberty on \$1,000 bail Thursday, following his indictment on a charge of perjury by the federal grand jury which was called in Tacoma to investigate the Cronkite case. The indictment was one of the two secret true bills returned by the investigating body. The charge is based upon Reid's testimony that Stewart had been aboard his boat after his departure from Kelso, which followed the theft of several thousand dollars from the bank. This testimony was offered in Tacoma last spring, when Mrs. Maude E. Stewart, the cashier's wife, was suing the New York Life and Mutual Life insurance companies for the \$40,000 her husband carried. Mrs. Stewart won but the case was appealed to the United States circuit court and is still pending.
