

HOMESTEAD TO BE DEDICATED

Historical Society Will Have Ceremony Saturday

Restored and placed in the hands of the Washington State Historical society, the John R. Jackson homestead, 12 miles south of Choballa, will be formally dedicated at 1:30 p. m. Saturday.

The homestead consist of a log cabin and an acre of ground. It was there the first territorial district court in Washington was held, in 1853. Many famous soldiers and statesmen made the Jackson homestead their headquarters when in the West.

Ceremonies will be in charge of Walter S. Travis, professor of history at the College of Puget Sound. Professor Edmund S. Meany, of the University of Washington, will take a prominent part, as will John Arthur, Seattle attorney.

Lumber Shipments on Sound Increase

Puget Sound, Willapa Harbor and Grays Harbor shipped 60 per cent more lumber during September, 1922, than during the same month last year, according to figures compiled by the Merchants' Exchange department of the Chamber of Commerce, Thursday. Puget sound led the other districts in volume of business, with a total of 25,300,000 board feet, and was first in the shipment of lumber to the Atlantic coast, with a total for the month of 28,539,000 board feet.

Freight Movement Shows Big Growth

An increase of \$18,238,157 in the value of freight moved over Seattle wharves during September, as compared with the same month last year, is shown in the latest report compiled by Port Warden Fred M. Lathe.

The total for September was \$52,347,300. Total cargo tonnage for September was 495,957, an increase of 33,993 tons over September, 1921.

CRIME EXPOSED BY DOG'S BARK

Police Say Body in Fire Stolen From Grave

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Oct. 20.—Starting with nothing but the vigorous barking of a dog as a clue, the police have uncovered what may prove to be one of the boldest crimes in the history of the state. Thus far the investigation has established the fact that a grave was robbed and the body of a young woman taken from it is expected to be positively identified as the charred body taken from a garage fire in which Harry R. Brenn was reported to have lost his life.

The facts developed to date are these:

Harry R. Brenn, 24 years old, a former soldier, with \$16,000 insurance on his life, is missing. Early in the morning of Sept. 27, a garage owned by Brenn was burned. In the ruins a body was found, so charred that identification was all but impossible. Mrs. Brenn said this was the body of her husband and was known to have the remains cremated so that she could take the ashes with her back to her home in Germany.

"The Importance of Bird Life," G. Inness Hartley; Century Co. A revelation of the importance of bird life to human life this book will prove to most readers.

To the average city-bred person, the place of the bird in nature is just the one to which the esthetic value of its song and plumage entitle it; the farmer, who actually has the song and plumage to enjoy, expresses his attitude mainly by shot-guns and scare-crows and bits of rag on a bush and tree to frighten winged thieves away.

As a matter of fact, birds are of supreme importance in that economy of nature which enables man to be fed; the stomachs of even the rascal birds prove when examined that they do more good by destroying enormous quantities of insects than harm of any kind. Birds also spread plant life, including forests; and they act as scavengers.

"We seldom use a voluntary biography. And even those that we request, often come in replete with high-sounding phrases such as 'I am one of the best known men in the city. My family has the largest collection of silverware in the county.'"

"Naturally we don't print panegyrics such as that either, but start boiling down." Marquis thinks that men are just as egotistical as women when it comes to talking about themselves. He is also confident that equal suffrage and the growing tendency of women to march more into the affairs of things will greatly aid the man bringing the disparity which has always existed between them and men in the number of figures before the public eye.
