Cheese Croquettes

By Bertha E. Shapleigh Of Columbia University Cheese croquettes may be served with a cream sauce, as the main dish for luncheon or supper. Or made much smaller they are an excellent accompaniment to salad. 2 tablespoons butter 4 tablespoons flour 1 cup milk Yolks 3 eggs 1 pound cheese cut into dice Salt and cayenne pepper to taste Fine dried bread crumbs Whites of eggs Melt butter, add flour, and cook without browning for two minutes. Add milk and cook until smooth and thick. Beat eggs slightly, and add to the above with the cheese and seasonings. Cook until cheese melts, then spread on a plate to cool. Shape into balls or cylinders; dip in egg whites diluted with a little water, roll in crumbs, and fry one minute in fat hot enough to brown a piece of bread in 40 seconds. Drain.
