

**CONGRESS ACTS ON TAX EVASION**  
Millionaires Dodge Pay-  
ments to U. S.  
WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—Con-  
gress will be the court of last re-  
sort to decide if millionaire stock-  
holders in giant corporations are  
evading the payment of hundreds  
of millions of dollars in income  
taxes this year.  
Representative Fear of Wisconsin  
charges evasion is the direct result  
of Secretary Mellon's recent ruling  
permitting the excess profits of cor-  
porations to become surplus and to  
be distributed in the shape of stock  
dividends.  
Mellon's defense is that present  
surtaxes are so high that "larger  
taxpayers inevitably seek every per-  
missible means of avoiding the re-  
alization of income subject to sur-  
tax."  
Mellon's annual report to congress  
the other day points out that "ac-  
cording to the best estimates avail-  
able, the total yield of all surtaxes  
in respect to the business of the tax-  
able year 1922 will not exceed \$350,-  
000,000 and the returns for several  
years have been declining from  
about \$800,000,000 in 1911 to about  
\$390,000,000 for 1921."  
Mellon would reduce the surtaxes  
from a maximum of 50 to 25 per  
cent on incomes over \$200,000 a  
year.  
Fear is preparing to show con-  
gress that such a reduction would  
cut in half the taxes due from the  
millionaire holders of the new stock  
dividends. He says these rich men  
would profit on at least half a bil-  
lion dollars, at the expense of the  
government.  
**FARM BUREAU HAS NEW HEAD**  
CHICAGO, Dec. 15.—Oscar Brad-  
fute, Xenia, O., was elected president  
of the American Farm Bureau fed-  
eration, at the closing session of the  
annual convention here, yesterday.  
He will succeed James H. Howard,  
Amen, Ia., who declined the offer of  
re-election.  
Bradfute has been vice president  
of the federation since its organiza-  
tion, three years ago.  
Dr. W. J. Walker, Willows, Cal.,  
was elected vice president.  
Other officers will be appointed  
later by a special committee.  
**Wounded Man Lost His Purse on Car**  
Someone in Seattle found a slim  
little purse on an Alki car Saturday  
night. It didn't have much in it—a  
ten-dollar bill, a receipted telephone  
statement, a key, perhaps, and a few  
pennies.

ment.  
Meanwhile, the man who lost it, a  
wounded man with three children,  
just barely breathing the current to  
care for his little family, is penniless.  
He came back from France three  
years ago, after spending a long time  
in a hospital. He is trying to pay for  
a little home.  
Saturday night, after he lost his  
purse, he had just three car tokens  
left, not a cent to provide for his  
family during the week.


