



Republican Conventions.

The convention to nominate state officers will meet in Grand Forks, July 31, and the delegate convention will meet in Fargo May 10.

Each county is entitled to two delegates at large and representation in the state convention is to be based on the average vote cast for congressmen and governor in 1898. Each county will also get one delegate at large for every 50 votes or major fraction, making a total of 629 members, instead of 590 last year.
