

Accidentally Shot.

A sad accident occurred early Tuesday morning on L. K. Myers' farm, 9 miles northwest of Hope. About 7 o'clock James T. Saunders, better known as "Jim," was found dead in the granary and a discharged revolver by his side.

From R. C. McClellan, his brother-in-law, who lives on the farm, and Wm. Saunders, a brother, we learn the following facts:

Mr. Saunders was assisting Mr. McClellan in the harvest field and arose early Tuesday morning, as usual, and assisted in doing the chores. After breakfast, it being too wet to go into the field, he went into the granary, some distance from the house, where the men sleep during the summer months, and was the last time he was seen alive.

When it was time to go to work he was not around, so Mr. McClellan went to the granary and was terribly shocked to find Mr. Saunders lying upon his back, dead; an ugly wound in the forehead and a revolver near by.

Coroner Baker was immediately summoned and it was decided he met death by the accidental discharge of his revolver. An inquest was not deemed necessary. The supposition is that while removing his coat from his trunk, the revolver may have dropped from the pocket, or the hammer may have caught in some way. The exact facts may never be known.

James T. Saunders was about 26 years of age, financially well to do, and a hard working man. He has a host of friends who mourn his departure.

The funeral was held at the house yesterday at 10 o'clock and the remains buried in the Hope cemetery.

Appeal to Hunters.

On Aug. 20th, the North Dakota prairies will be alive with sportsmen, and for the next few days their tables and those of their friends, will groan with the toothsome young prairie chicken. How about the old chicken in the bag? You do not want them on your table, and you cannot very well be known to give them to your friends, and in most cases they are left to spoil. Why not spare the mother to raise a brood another year, brother sportsman? At best it only serves to swell the number in the bag, and no true sportsman should kill a bird with only this motive in view. You can easily distinguish the flight of the mother bird from the young during the early part of the season, and a little care will make it possible to spare it. It is a well known fact that older hens are preferred as mothers in growing game poultry, because they raise much larger and stronger broods. Why should not this apply to prairie chickens as well? Then look at the matter from a humane point of view. You know that some belated broods in the early hunting season still need the mother's care in order to live, and even in the more advanced coveys the mother is worth much more to the young chick left alive than it is to you. Brother sportsman, think it over, and I know the result will be the saving of many a mother to raise another brood. Better cut this out and put it in your hunting coat pocket.

HOOKER WILL BE SAVED.

The Stranded Cable Ship Hooker Will, It Is Said, Be Planted and Repaired.

Maj. Gen. Otis telegraphed the war department that the United States cable repair ship Hooker, which was considered a total loss, is certain to be saved. The Hooker went ashore on Corregidor island, at the mouth of Manila bay. She had material for a submarine cable on board, and it was intended to use her in connecting all the important islands of the Philippine group by telegraph. Gen. Otis in his dispatch said that arrangements had been made for getting the Hooker off the rocks and taking her to Cavite arsenal, where she will receive repairs sufficient to permit her to go to Hong Kong, where she will be thoroughly overhauled and put in first-class condition.

OCEANIC A FLOATING PALACE.

Newspaper Men Show the Beauties of the New Mammoth Ocean Liner.

The White Star Steamship company invited a few newspaper men of New York city to inspect the new steamship Oceanic. The latter reported after their visit that they had been shown through all the departments of this immense floating palace, and found it in every respect quite up to the standard which has been set by the company.

One of the most interesting features of the ship was the library—a light and commodious apartment on the promenade deck, 40 feet wide and more than 50 feet long. Its height is nearly ten feet. Along the sides are many cozy nooks in which are comfortable armchairs and writing desks. The decorations are those of the period of Louis XV. The walls, main beams and stanchions are enriched by carvings of solid oak. In the ceiling is an octagonal skylight 22 feet from the floor. The bookcases, tables and chairs are of carved mahogany, upholstered in green.
