DEAD MAN WINS CYCLE RACE.

The Victor in an Australian Contest Goes Under the Tape a Corpse.

Australian advices by the steamship Mowera tell of a remarkable bicycle race in Sydney, which was won by a dead man.

It occurred at a big electric light carnival. In a one-mile race there were 50 entries, some of the fastest men in Australia taking part in it. While 10,000 people watched this particular race, which was for a magnificent cup, young James Somerville passed under the tape a winner, though dead.

At the start he quickly forged ahead, closely followed by another crack rider named Percy Cliff. They left 45 riders away in the rear and shot around the track almost wheel to wheel. When within 25 yards of the tape Somerville, who still held by half a wheel, was seen to relax his hold on the handlebars. His pedals whirled around, however, and he pluckily held his position. Five yards from the tape Cliff put on a tremendous spurt and struck Somerville's hind wheel, shooting the machine with a rocket under the tape.

The crowd yelled wildly, but silence ensued when Somerville, after crossing the tape, plunged head foremost from the machine.

When picked up he was dead. Physicians who examined his body said he must have had an attack of heart failure on the last lap.

POWER SUDDENLY CUT OFF.

Switch Device in Use in Chicago to Prevent Crossing Accidents.

The railroad companies have assumed the responsibility for the safety of life and person on many of the surface crossings, especially where trolley cars cross their lines at grade. They utilize a simple system in the matter. It might be called an interlocking system. A watchman in a tower keeps a lookout for the coming and going of trains on the railroad lines, and the approach of the street cars. When he sees a train and a street car approaching at the same time he pulls a lever in his tower. That act "switches" a section about two feet long in one of the rails of the street car line, and the current is shut off from the trolley line. Of course, the car is brought to a stop—suddenly sometimes, with the result of shaking up passengers. If it be at night, of course, the cars are darkened and passengers have to sit out the wait with no light. But the system, according to railroad men, of street and steam lines, is the safest and surest yet devised for the prevention of the "grade crossing horror," which used to figure so frequently and prominently in the newspapers.
