HABITS OF BRITISH WOMEN.

President of a Woman's Club of New York is Greatly Shocked by What She Witnessed.

Mrs. Cornelia Robinson, president of the West End Woman's Club, New York city, has just returned from England with a big store of impressions gained during six weeks there, which she has divulged at the club's first meeting this season. She was shocked at the smoking-rooms in the English women's clubs. "I went to the Pioneer club," she said, "a beautiful building in Grafton street, beautifully furnished, perfectly equipped. They took me into their smoking-room, a beautiful room. About 25 women were lounging about on divans, smoking cigarettes. I've been in a great many American women's clubs, but I never saw a thing like that. They asked me to have a cigarette. I declined.

"It may be all right for women to smoke, but when it becomes the custom for American women to do so I don't call it a retrograde movement. I shall call it emancipation or progress. In nations that we consider not yet risen to our civilization it is usual for women to smoke. English women have not yet advanced beyond the habit—that is all."

"Do all English women smoke?" asked a member.

"Oh, no, indeed!" said Mrs. Robinson. "Does the queen smoke?" came another question.

"I did not get well enough acquainted with her to find out," was the reply.

CUBAN SWINDLING SCHEME.

A Case of Alleged Bureaucratic Treachery That is Evidently Either a Hoax or a Fraud.
