By a vote of 126 to 8 the conference of temperance leaders held in Washington, D. C., last month, placed its approval upon the Sheppard-Hobson prohibition resolution as it now stands. This after lengthy discussion of different forms of amendment. A representative committee of nineteen was appointed to confer with members of the Sixty-fourth Congress who will champion the measure.
