WIRELESS MESSAGE RECEIVED IN HOPE

Mayor Major Receives test Message Through John Baldwin's Wireless Station.

The following message and letter are self explanatory:

American Radio Relay League, received at Radio Station 9QL, time 11:35 p. m., date Feb. 21, 1916, from R. Station 9XN, relayed via R. Station 9XV.

To Mayor of Hope. Instructions, please sign and return. M. S. G. Democracy requires that a people who govern and educate themselves should be so armed and desciplined that they can protect themselves.

My Dear Sir:

I enclose herewith a message (MSG) which I received via the R. R. L., with instructions to deliver to you. The purpose of the message is as follows:

The military authorities of U. S. A. desired to test the ability of the amateur wireless operators to carry on messages in case of a war wherein an enemy army had taken possession of or disabled the regular government wireless stations.

This then is a test message which was sent out from the Rock Island Arsenal, Illinois, first to radio station 9XE from which station it was forwarded via wireless to stations chosen to send it on along selected relay routes, so that the MSG might be delivered to the governors of every state and the mayors of cities. MSG left station 9XE at 11 p. m. sharp last night was received here thirty-five minutes later.
