Following an attack of heart trouble from which he has been suffering for several months, W. E. Elliott passed away at his home in this city early Tuesday morning. Altho he has been sick for some time there has always been hope that he would recover until very recently when it was seen that the disease had secured too strong a hold to be thrown off. Shortly before he died the realization came to him that he was not to be of this world much longer and he made all final arrangements.

William Edward Elliott was born in Belleville, Ontario, Canada on Feb. 9th, 1862. On April 11th, 1884, he arrived in Hope with his mother and settled on a home stead one mile south of Sherbrooke where he resided until 1907 when he moved to Hope which has been his home since that time. On November 1st, 1893 he was united in marriage to Miss Jennie C. Drakely and to them were born two daughters, Edna, who died August 18th, 1889 aged three years and Hattie, who with wife and brother, James, who now resides in Saskatchewan, Can., is left to mourn his loss.

He was honored and respected by all who knew him, always fair and open in his business dealings, charitable and kind to those in distress, a true and loyal friend, a generous and loving husband and father. His death is a loss to the community. He was an ardent member of the I. O. O. F., Masonic and Eastern Star fraternal organizations.

The funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at the Methodist Church. The Masons escorting the remains and the I. O. O. F. lodge attending in a body. Rev. C. T. Ensign conducted the services. At the cemetery the Masonic service was given very impressively by Past Master F. W. Elred.

The floral offerings were many and profuse, showing to a small extent the high esteem in which the deceased was held. The family has the sincere sympathy of everybody in their great loss.
