



A Three Hour Day for Horses

The horse has a three hour day according to a Minnesota investigation carried on under the direction of Thomas Cooper, now the director of the North Dakota Experiment Station. It was found that a farm horse averaged about 100 hours labor per year or about 3 hours per day. It was also found that the cost of maintenance for the horse was \$55.00 per year. This emphasizes the need of watching closely to see that too many horses are not kept. It also emphasizes the need of keeping brood mares and raising colts, so as to get more returns from the work horses than the three hours of labor per day.


