STATEMENT BY CHAIRMAN WILLIAM LEMKE

Hope defeated Cooperstown High for the second time this season Saturday by the score of 13 to 6. Open plays featured the game, as also did the same unfair play as marred the previous game played against them. The game was played under protest for the second half, Cooperstown refusing to obey decision made by the referee.

In the first half Hope showed Cooperstown they had more football than was expected of them by holding them for downs on the one yard line.

The find of the season was in Warner who played a star game at right end, scoring Hope's first touchdown via the aerial route. Jake Fullmer gave Cooperstown a good exhibition of line-plunging by going six yards on the fourth down for a touchdown and also kicked Hope's only goal, making the score 13 points.

Cooperstown made their only touchdown in the second half by a fake end run.

The stars of the game were Sussex, Capt. Ray, and Warner, the latter being of particular mention considering that it was his first game.
