NOTES FROM THE COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT.

The next regular teachers' examinations will be held in the court house in Linton beginning at 8:30 a. m., November 9th and 10th, 1916. Teachers holding permits or those whose certificates expire in November, 1916, should be present. If teachers appear for examinations, their certificates or permits are valid until the results of the examinations are given out. If they do not appear, their certificates automatically expire November 9, 1916.

School boards are requested to see that every school is protected by a fire break. I have been in nearly all districts of the county this fall and find this matter often neglected. Let us make a united effort in the protection of public property.

Teachers are being instructed to urge school boards to furnish flags and flag poles. A 50 cent flag for each school in your district will be a splendid investment. The school boards that have not furnished flags for their schools should not delay longer. It is required by law.

Miss Anna Brill, Miss Clara Carley and Adrian Bond received certificates for Reading Circle work. By virtue of these certificates their teachers' certificates may be renewed for a period of two years. The next Reading Circle examinations will be given on the second Thursday and Friday in May.

Miss Clara Carley gave a basket social in her school house in McCully school district which netted the goodly sum of \$77.05. This will be used to purchase various supplies needed in the school room.

Following is the figures on supreme court justice as compared between Burleigh F. Spalding, former chief justice, and J. E. Robinson, leading non-partisan candidate. Both these men live in Fargo in the same ward. It is interesting to know just how their home people think about them. For that reason, we give herewith the vote of the home ward of Spalding and Robinson, an adjoining ward, and for their home county. BLAMES LEGISLATURE, NOT COURT.

The New Rockford Daily Capital which has fought untruly for the interests of its town in the capital removal matter, does not agree with some of the local critics who are condemning the supreme court decision and assailing the motives of the members of the bench. The Capital says: "It is true the Supreme Court decided the capital removal proposition against New Rockford, not on the merit, but on the statute alone. The referendum statute made no provision under which the 25 per cent of voters could be determined, whether on the vote for Secretary of State, Treasurer, Auditor or Governor, in 1914, or in 1920. Neither did it provide as a duty for the Secretary of State to advertise the amendment or put the question on the ballot. But it did delegate to the legislature the power to enact a law covering all these provisions, and perfecting the referendum in the manner, and for the purposes and procedure, as followed by this city in its struggle to get the question on the ballot. But it didn't do it."

"The Supreme Court has no power to make laws, only to construe them after they are in force. A few of the narrow-minded ones here are abusing the members of the court shamefully, for no reason other than that it could not make a law in our favor. Had the court made any other decision it would have gone out of its zone and Jurisdiction and have been the laughing stock of court and bar throughout the United States."

It is also noted that the New Rockford boomers are not willing to lay down, but expect to have the matter again brought up in the next legislature, by a concurrent resolution which will be offered providing for the removal of the capital, and giving the people an opportunity to vote upon the same at a future election. The legislature which failed to provide the necessary machinery for referring the matter to the people of the state, was to blame for the result of the decision and not the court itself.


