

# THE WIFE OF A YOUNG WOMAN OF NORTH IDAHO

## Young Couple, Shoot Down Step-father of Young Wife and Mother and Then Give Themselves Up.

Colfax, Wash., Sept. 16.—Wesley Brownell, aged 25, and his 17-year-old wife, Winnie, residents of Culebec, Ida., shot and killed yesterday A. Neaves, stepfather and Mrs. Brownell. Both, the authorities say, made full confession.

Neaves was charged by his daughter with having maltreated her in Idaho and aiding others to do so.

The shooting took place at the Charles Long ranch, near Clifax, where Neaves and his wife had come, bringing with them the Brownell children.

Brownell and his wife had walked 100 miles in search of Neaves. They had been without food for more than a day and hid out in the barn at Long's ranch, waiting for Neaves to appear.

When the Longs left the home to visit neighbors, the Brownells entered the house. After sending the children outside, Brownell shot Neaves five times, according to his statement. As Neaves fell, the daughter shot him through the head. Failing to get telephone communication with the sheriff's office at Colfax, the Brownells took the children to neighbors and started to walk to Colfax to give themselves up. Sheriff Carter and Deputy Cole, who were subsequently informed by neighbors, found the couple as they were making their way along the road.

Mrs. Brownell was masquerading as a man, her husband having cut her hair and dressed her in male attire. Both were worn out.

They told the sheriff the act was done because they could not get justice in Idaho. They stated that they swore out a complaint against a bachelor and were threatened with being killed so they left their babes with Justice Stewart of Culebec and fled to the woods and mountains. Later they decided to come back and kill those who had wronged Mrs. Brownell.

They found Justice Stewart had placed the children with Mrs. Neaves and that she and her husband had taken them to the home at Colfax. The Brownells, being without means, followed on foot.

The story they told the authorities was a most pitiful and straight-forward confession with no regret for the killing.

Mrs. Brownell said she wished to kill her stepfather and fired the final shot in his head as he lay struggling on the porch. Both reloaded their guns after the shooting.

parties will name their candidates to go on state, congressional, legislative and county tickets at the general election in November.

The main state-wide contest so far as a gubernatorial nominee is concerned is between Governor A. O. Eberhart, who is seeking re-nomination, and a field of five rivals in the Republican camp. C. M. Andrist of Minneapolis and P. M. Ringdal of Crookston are aspirants for the Democratic nomination for governor.

United States Senator Knute Nelson is seeking endorsement for re-election and is opposed by James A. Peterson of Minneapolis on the Republican side. The Democratic choice for the senatorship is Dan W. Lawler of St. Paul.

Republicans and Democrats have plural candidates for most of the places on the state ticket. Other contests are embraced in several of the congressional districts. The Prohibitionists have practically an entire state ticket in the field and the Public Ownership and Socialist Labor parties have selected candidates for governor. The Progressives have not determined the stand they will take with regard to the Republican candidates. A definite decision as to whether an independent state ticket will be put in the field is expected to be reached at a conference of the Progressive party leaders at the end of this week.

### Busy Week for Wilson.

Chicago, Sept. 16.—This week a large section of the middle west is to have its first opportunity of meeting Governor Woodrow Wilson since he entered the presidential race. Governor Wilson will start his tour tomorrow with a speech at the Tri-State fair at Sioux City. Wednesday and Thursday he will address Democratic meetings at St. Paul, Minneapolis and Milwaukee. On Friday he will be the big attraction at the formal opening of the Ohio Democratic campaign at Columbus. He is scheduled to close the week with a speech in Pittsburgh Saturday night.

# THE EXPOSITION

## Commissioner of the San Diego Show Here for Development Congress.

Among those who arrived to attend the meeting of the Commercial clubs of the state was John A. Fox, commissioner-at-large of the Panama-California exposition. Mr. Fox has just finished a tour of the southern part of the state with the Salt Lake boosters and has been awakening interest in the state's participation at San Diego.

Speaking of the matter this morning to a representative of the Capital News, Mr. Fox said: "I think this meeting of the Commercial clubs of the state thus early to crystallize sentiment throughout the state is favor of liberal participation at both expositions is most opportune. Never before has there been such an opportunity for exploitation and advertisement of the resources of the west as will be given in 1916 by the building of the two great expositions on the coast in that year. These expositions will not only draw thousands of people into and through the western states but will afford them an opportunity to show themselves to the best advantage through the exhibits they will make. Idaho has wonders and beauties that if known would attract thousands of tourists to the state every year and once these tourists were in the state they would see just such wonderful opportunities for investment as I have seen on the trip we have just completed."

"No state in the union has such an abundance of water power and no state has made the marked progress in irrigation that is to be found here in Idaho. San Diego is planning to have the most wonderful irrigation exhibit that has ever been shown in the history of the world at her exposition, and as we have 1400 acres of ground there for our site right in the heart of the city, I am hopeful that this state will make the special irrigation exhibit. I believe that some one of the big projects could be reproduced there in miniature and then around this could be arranged models of each one of the several projects in the state and that such an exhibit would prove more attractive than anything that could be shown. It would advertise Idaho as the irrigation state of the Union and those who saw the exhibit at San Diego would want to return east by the way of the state and see these things for themselves."

Mr. Fox says they are making wonderful progress at San Diego and that the commissions from Arizona and New Mexico have just been there and selected their sites and each has recommended to their state that \$250,000 be appropriated at the next session of the legislature for participation.

# GOOD PROFIT FROM A PRUNE ORCHARD

Boise Valley Fruit Grower Realize \$600 Per Acre This Year.

Eagle, Sept. 16.—O. F. Short has a nine-acre prune orchard, 18 years old, that will bring him in a gross return of fully \$600 per acre this year. His prune orchard is said by fruit experts to have the greatest crop per acre in the state, this year. His trees are of unusual size and they yielded a crop this year averaging about 2 1/2 carloads of fruit per acre.

Prunes Net \$500 Per Acre.

Mr. Short had a five-year contract with the Mayfield Fruit company for all of his prunes at \$20 per ton, delivered to the scales in bulk at the packing house at the edge of his orchard. This is the second year of this contract.

Mr. Short's prune crop from the nine acres is conservatively estimated at 23 carloads, or better than 2 1/2 cars per acre. There are 1000 25-pound crates per car, or 12 1/2 tons per car. In other words, Mr. Short's orchard is averaging 31 1/2 tons per acre, and is selling the prunes at \$20 per ton, or \$632 1/2 per acre gross. The Mayfield Fruit company has charge of the packing and shipping of the prunes. Mr. Short stands the expense of picking the prunes, which costs him \$4 per ton, or \$125 per acre, so that his prune crop this year is netting him \$500 per acre, not counting the cost of the care of his orchard, spraying, etc.

Model Packing House.

The packing house at the Short orchard is a model of convenience and is said to be the best prune packing house in Idaho. It is located on a siding built this year by the Idaho Traction company. There are 20 pickers in this orchard, 28 packers and five helpers, or 53 in all.

The crop from the Short prune orchard is double that of any previous year.
