

ATTENTION BORAH IS MADE BY PAPER OWNED BY HAINES

Caldwell Tribune Declares That No Republican Need Feel Himself Bound to Support the Senator.

Has John M. Haines, Republican candidate for governor, opened up an active campaign against William E. Borah, nominee of the same party for United States senator because Borah does not stand for Taft's theft of the Chicago nomination?

Apparently he has done so and from the first open attack it would appear that the war will be a merry one before the campaign shall come to a close. The attack is published in the Caldwell Tribune, a newspaper owned and controlled by Haines and published and edited under direct supervision of Haines' friends from Haines headquarters and from the headquarters of the state central committee. It is one of the newspapers bought by Haines and Haines influences before the primary for the purpose of advancing the interests of Haines. The expenditure of money in this behalf is a portion of the items of expense incidental to that campaign which were not included in the sworn schedule of expenses filed by him after the primary.

The Caldwell paper's attack upon Borah, bitter in the extreme as it is, has created a sensation among the friends of Borah, many of whom avow their intention to return the knife to the gubernatorial candidate unless he quickly and publicly disavow his paper's attitude.

"Under the circumstances no Republican need feel any obligation to give Mr. Borah his support," declares Haines' Caldwell paper, which then continues: "The fact a Republican is in duty bound to do just the opposite, Senator Borah should come out flat-footed in support of President Taft or else get off the Republican ticket."

But this is only a small part of this bitter attack. It is worth while to read the article, which is published as an editorial in the Haines paper and which is as follows:

Borah Must Decide Where He Stands.

The Republicans of Idaho are right in insisting that Senator William E. Borah reach a decision as to what he is politically. He is either a Republican or he is not. In either event the people have a right to know just where he stands. He cannot elude, trim and dodge on this occasion. His intimation that he is a Republican for senator, but otherwise as "progressive" as any of the Roosevelt followers might mean any old thing. His present position smacks so much of Rooseveltism as to make him justly open to the charge of treachery to the party, of which he is a nominee. He poses as a Republican and yet cannot give his support to the nominees of that party. Under the circumstances no Republican need feel any obligation to give to Mr. Borah his support. In fact a Republican is in duty bound to do just the opposite. Senator Borah should come out flat-footed in support of President Taft or else get off the Republican ticket.

Republicans should bear in mind that Senator William E. Borah is not necessary to the party. It got along very well without him in the past and it can do so again. The people of Idaho know that he nor no other man is necessary to the state. Idaho will grow and develop after he has passed into oblivion just as she grew and developed before he was discovered.

Senator Borah is engaged, so he says, in fighting for the principles of progress within the Republican party. If he is fighting within the party he must accept the last decree of the party—he must stand by the results of the Chicago convention. To remain in the party to fight the party is simply to conduct a guerilla warfare—a warfare that has always deserved contempt and merited quick and severe punishment. He can fight for his political principles within the party but for the present he must also fight for the nominees of the party.

To be quite frank Senator Borah has simply been frightened by the Roosevelt followers. Not many months ago he had no occasion to take up arms in behalf of Roosevelt—the nomination of Taft was quite acceptable. The Roosevelt followers insisted that if he wanted their support he should not support President Taft. He fell a willing victim, feeling assured that as the nominee of the Republican party he would get the Republican support.

JOKER FOUND IN THE AMENDMENT TO CONSTITUTION

A joker in the proposed constitutional amendment providing for a statewide referendum vote has made the Boise Democrats shy off from the whole proposition like a country horse on a city street.

The Democrats of the city are not sure that they want that amendment after all. They are sure that they want some amendment providing for referendum votes but they can't decide whether that would be better than nothing or not. Of course, all good and loyal Democrats want the referendum vote on almost every sort of proposition. Not to do that is almost as great a heresy as sympathy for Roosevelt is to the standpat Republican.

The resolution as passed by both houses of the last state legislature and now submitted to the people provides for 51 per cent of all votes cast for governor at the last general election before any referendum vote can be legally carried.

"And thereby hangs the tale." The Democrats here point out that few votes of this kind are ever carried by any such tremendous majority. So many voters fail to express their choice when a referendum matter is submitted to them. While almost everybody gets to the polls and casts his ballot for the man he wants to see in the chair of the chief executive, they don't always at the same time express their decision on a referendum question.

Different in Other States. Most of the states that have this law make the majority based on the total number of persons voting on that particular question. The vote for governor has nothing to do with the vote on the amendment and the majority is figured for each on its own basis. To try to get 51 per cent of the votes cast for governor before any measure can be carried is foolishness, they think, and most of the Democrats here believe that the plan will not work out at all.

John Nugent, Frank Kinyon, Fred Flood and others of statewide prominence are half inclined to oppose the idea from start to finish. They don't like it a little bit but they don't know whether to get out and fight it or get behind it and push. If they do support it, the plan will probably be to get later another amendment adopted that will provide for a majority of those voting on that particular measure before it has legally carried.

STATE WILL SELL VALUABLE LAND IN LATAH COUNTY

Two Thousand Acres Will Be Disposed of in Small Tracts—Is Fine Agricultural Land.

Valuable state land in Latah county will be sold this winter, thereby permitting settlers to occupy it. A tract of 2000 acres, one-third of which will be placed on the market, is located in that county and was formerly held by the Potlatch Lumber company. The state land department is in receipt of over 100 letters from prospective settlers in almost every state in the Union asking for information relative to Idaho lands and this is being given to them just as fast as the department can meet the inquiries. Some of them may decide to buy in Latah county.

This land is the first to be turned back to the state by the Potlatch Lumber company. About 12 years ago the company purchased the standing timber of approximately 24,000 acres in Latah and Clearwater counties, with the proviso that the timber be removed from the same within a period of 20 years from the date of sale, and that with its removal the logged-off land revert back to the state. The company, seeing that the removal of such an immense amount of timber was almost impossible within such a comparatively short time (three-fourths of the time already having expired), sought to have the state sell the land on which the timber is located as a matter of protection. This the state land board agreed to do, and at a sale last year the lumber company purchased about 18,000 acres of the land containing timber. There remains about 600 acres of the land belonging to the state, and it is one-third of this amount located in Latah county which will be disposed of at the coming sale.

The land in question is located within a range of seven miles of the lumbering town of Bovill, and with the removal of the stumpage, excellent land for farming purposes will be had. During the winter months, with a continuance of the enlightened operations by the Potlatch company, more land will be available for public sale, and all persons seeking information will be advised by the state land and immigration departments. The land near Bovill has been appraised by Mr. Daggett at a valuation of \$10 per acre, and no one tract will be sold containing less than 40 acres. It is the desire of the state to encourage settlers to take up small tracts of land in preference to large areas, thus going to settle up the

Accomplish in the Killing of Boyce

Amarillo, Tex., Sept. 17.—The identity of a mysterious accomplice who, it is said, planned with J. B. Sneed for the murder of Al G. Boyce on Saturday, furnished the principal interest in the discussion here of the second killing by Sneed as the result of the elopement last fall of his wife with his victim of Saturday.

It is considered almost certain that Sneed will be taken to Fort Worth to stand trial for the murder of Captain Al G. Boyce, father of his victim of Saturday, on Jan. 13 last. This trial is set for November.

The Potter county grand jury failed to complete its investigation yesterday after examining 30 witnesses and developing the fact that there was an accomplice to the murder, who disappeared immediately after the shooting. No description of him was secured.

While the jury was in session the funeral of Boyce was held. The procession passed within a block of the jail, where in his cell Sneed consulted with his relatives and attorneys, the latter representing the best criminal attorneys of the state.
