



STRAND IS TRADED OVER THE COUNTRY

Spokane Southpaw Has Hurtled Back and Forth by Cohn.

Using Paul Strand, the youthful southpaw who broke into Western Tri-State company this season, as his "hoss" John Cohn, owner of the Spokane Indians in the Northwestern league, has performed trading stunts calculated to make David Harum with laurels. Cohn has thereby added about \$5000 in cash to his exchequer.

The possession of Strand enabled Cohn to secure Wuffli, Altman, Powell and Noyes, and in addition pull off two major league sales, Strand for \$5000 to the Boston Americans, and Noyes for \$4000 to the Boston Nationals. And what is more, Cohn still has the kid heaver on his payroll as his individual baseball property.

Briefly, here is a history of the deals surrounding Strand: The youngster was picked up in the bushes near Tacoma in the winter of 1910, Cohn beating the other Northwestern league moguls to the promising southpaw with a contract. He was the early-season sensation of the circuit, his fame reaching Boston and resulting in a \$5000 sale, half of the money down, according to Cohn.

Strand proved a "morning glory" pitcher, and failed to impress scouts during the middle of the season. Boston turned him back to Spokane, but awarded Wuffli to Cohn for an option on Strand to August 20.

San Francisco traded Noyes, Altman and Powell to Spokane for Wuffli, the infielder who was setting the Northwestern league afire. Noyes immediately jumped into fame, winning 15 straight games and figuring in a \$4000 sale to Boston of the National league.

Noyes not only brought more coin into the Cohn strong box through the sale to Boston, but he gave the Indians the needed strength to place them in the pennant race, ably assisted by Altman and Powell.

As for Strand, that worthy was sent to San Francisco, back to Spokane, and thence to Walla Walla. He "came back" with the latter club and has been pitching good ball since joining the Indians again.

Boston failed to exercise the option and Cohn now figures that next season, and Strand will be only 21 years old then, he can sell his husky southpaw "hoss" once more, and if the lad doesn't stick "up there" the road will once more be open for a few David Harum maneuvers.

Honus Wagner will be a great attraction in Washington when the Senators and the Pirates play their post-season series. Honus has not played in the capital city since 1899.

ALL-STAR TEAM ON SEASON AVERAGES

Boise Gets the Pitcher and One Outfielder in the Line-Up.

If the All-Star club of the Western Tri-State league was selected from among the players who made the best fielding averages in the positions they played for the respective teams, an exceptionally fast organization would be picked. The fielding averages compiled by Secretary Keefe of the league give Boise two men who would be entitled to positions on a club of this kind if selected on an average, or Mays, pitcher, and Scott, fielder. This is a compliment to Mays. He was selected the all-star pitcher of the league by the sporting editor of this paper and now is given the choice of the first pitcher in the league on the averages he made during the season. Pendleton gets four of the players and Walla Walla secures three. La Grande is given one.

The averages compiled by the league's secretary have been a clear makeshift and are erroneous in many respects. That the secretary either did not know how to compile them, willfully neglected them, or was incompetent, is very evident. It is up to the league directors to find a different secretary next season. Newspapers on the circuit were never furnished copies of the averages until they put up a howl and then the secretary showed his preference, giving the averages to the papers in his home city before they were released over the circuit to all other papers. In every league that is playing protected baseball the averages have been carefully compiled and issued to all newspapers on the circuit for release on a certain date. If the league officials in the Western Tri-State league were aware of this rule they certainly displayed their ignorance of it. The policy will have to be changed next season, the averages issued at proper periods and released to all papers at the same time. If the present secretary is not competent the league should find a secretary who is.
