

AVIATOR GIVES EXHIBITION OF AERIAL STUNTS

Aeroplane Exhibitions Big Feature of the Malheur County Fair—May Be Seen in Boise.

Ontario, Sept. 28.—Aviator Christoferson, who thrilled the big crowds this week at the Malheur county fair, and who will give some of his aerial stunts at the Canyon county fair at Caldwell Friday and Saturday next week and perhaps at the Boise Intermountain fair the week following, gave a very successful demonstration at the Malheur county fair of dropping sacks of flour, in lieu of dynamite or some other high explosive, upon an imaginary battleship, in front of the crowded grandstand. Six sacks of flour were thus dropped from the aeroplane from a considerable height, and each sack struck the imaginary war vessel. The aviator cut all sorts of capers with his machine, over which he has almost perfect control. He made two flights each afternoon this week at the fair grounds. Every body present was greatly pleased.

Biplane Cost \$5000. The machine used by Christoferson cost \$5000 to build. It is the latest type headless Curtiss biplane, is 30 feet six inches wide and weighs 1000 pounds. It is driven by a 75-horsepower Curtiss gasoline engine. This engine is a remarkable piece of mechanism and cost \$2200. At the rear of the engine is a 7/8-foot propeller, which is driven at the rate of 1000 to 1200 revolutions per minute, which drives the aeroplane at the rate of 60 to 70 miles per hour. When starting to make a flight, the machine runs on the ground at the rate of 35 miles per hour before going into the air. This aeroplane carries four gallons of water, 12 gallons of gasoline and five gallons of lubricating oil. This biplane has 300 square feet of lifting surface. It is strongly built throughout. Aviator Christoferson is very courteous and each day at the close of the afternoon amusement program at the fair ground he would invite those wishing to see his machine at close range to come and inspect it, and many people did it.

One of Christoferson's thrilling stunts at Ontario was when he made a great dip from a height of 200 or more feet, and came so close to the ground that he touched the outstretched hand of a man standing in the center field in front of the grandstand. Christoferson is from San Diego, but makes Portland his headquarters. He has been an aviator for two years. He got \$1600 from the Malheur county fair association for making two flights each day for five days.

Features of Buckaroo Sports. The wild horse race Thursday was won by Bob Cavin of Star, Idaho. Earl McCullough of New Plymouth was second; Walter Toddull of Twin Falls, third; Walter Shimp of Willow Creek, fourth.

The bound and hare chase was an interesting feature. There were 14 wild horses used in the wild horse race Thursday. Thirty minutes elapsed after the first horse was brought from the corral before Manager Chapman gave the signal to saddle up. McPherson was the first to mount and get started off, but his horse was a very bad one, and he was among the very last to come under the wire. Syd McCoy, the famous bulldogger, couldn't get his horse on its feet long enough to saddle it, hence never got mounted in this race. Hick Lockett, one of Oregon's best buckaroos, also had an extremely bad actor. Hick's horse jumped the fence into center field the very first thing, and Hick didn't come within a mile of the winner in this race.

The Weiser band of 26 pieces, in their attractive oriental uniforms, proved to be a splendid feature of Thursday's big program. One of the features of the buckaroo sports at the Malheur county fair was the great bucking broncho riding by Montana Kate, who is one of the best women riders in the country.

Big Crowd Friday. Another big crowd visited the fair Friday, there being nearly as large a crowd as on Thursday. The hare and

hound chase is always interesting. Friday afternoon Aviator Christoferson showed his remarkable control over the air machine when he took a great dive in front of the grandstand and broke two little toy balloons fastened no higher than two feet from the ground.

Friday was Vale and Willow River day, and these districts sent large crowds to the fair. The bucking contests Friday afternoon were by far the best of the week. The New Plymouth band on Friday again pleased the large crowds present. The stock parade at 3 o'clock in front of the grandstand was a splendid one.

LIGHTWEIGHTS IN FIGHTING TRIM

Montana Kid and Driscoll Promise to Give Fans a Rare Treat.

Montana Kid, the lightweight who is to meet Tommy Driscoll here next month, is one of the fastest men in his class, yet he will have to face a man in Driscoll who can travel just as fast, is willing to step into the merry little ringside game with a grin and never backs away from punishment. The lightweights should make a decided hit in their go here before the faithful.

The Kid began boxing some years ago and he has been at it ever since. Clever and resourceful he had fought around the circuit, back and then some. During his career he has met some of the best men in his class, including Maurice Herrera, the human dispatch truck, securing a draw in 15 rounds. The newspapers thought the Kid was entitled to a decision. Jack Burke lasted just five rounds when he faced Montana Kid inside the ropes, for at the end of the fifth the Kid crossed with something and the count was tolled off. Jack Burke took the punishment of his life from the Kid and had it not been for the interference of the police would have been placed on a marble slab. The Kid got the decision in that go. Then he bumped up against Herrera and was given a decision in the seventh round on a foul.

No one ever called the go Montana Kid had with Joe Kneisle a fight. The Kid played with his victim for three rounds in what was billed to be a 20-round go, and then handed him an express train punch. That has been the way the Kid has been going. When he looked over Clyde Burnham, who was to go for 20 rounds, the Kid ripped off a left to the jaw and a right to the solar plexus, dropping Burnham in his tracks in the first round. It was an awful and sudden finish. Not satisfied with boxing one at a time the Kid took two on in the same ring when he boxed Tommy Leahy and Jack Brown and passed them into dreamland. This is the kind of a record the whirlwind boxer has who will meet Driscoll, and in enumerating his goes they were not all named by any means.
