


PRICES STEADY; OFFERINGS GOOD

Cold Weather Has Bad Effect on the Fresh Egg Supply.

The local markets opened this morning with prices steady but with indications for several changes during the week. Chicken receipts were good, a large number having been brought in by ranchers who came to attend the fair. Hog receipts were stronger than usual for the first of the week. The cold snap made a further decrease in the supply of fresh eggs and no peaches were received today but there is still a considerable supply on hand left over from last week. Vegetable offerings continue good. Prune Nectar, the new drink, made from Idaho purple prunes, was placed on the market today. Following are the prevailing prices:

CONDITIONS—High barometric pressure prevails except in the Atlantic states and lower lake region and over small areas near the Mexican boundary and in western Canada. Light precipitation has occurred at a few widely scattered places. Cool weather prevails in the west with freezing temperatures in parts of the plateau region and northern plains states. Fair weather may be expected to continue in Boise and its vicinity tonight and Tuesday, with heavy frost tonight. Kansas City Livestock. (By J. A. Rickart) Kansas City Stock Yards, Oct. 5.—Cattle received here this week \$4,100, last week 75,700, same week last year \$2,200. The total this week includes 11,900 calves, and the largest of the season. Prices on middle class killing steers declined first of the week, which had a tendency to reduce shipments after Tuesday. Dealers say there will be two more weeks of heavy supplies, in which case there may be more price reductions on the middle grades, though prime cattle are safe, and butcher kinds find a ready outlet. Stock cattle held up firm this week, but feeders followed in the wake of the declining middle class beef steers. Admitting the losses since the middle of August, beef steers will remain about \$1.50 higher than a year ago, and feeders are \$1.25 higher than then. Indiana and Illinois distillers began buying plain feeders here this week for their winter stock feeding, taking 50 loads weighing 1000 to 1100 pounds, at a cost around \$5.75. Last year these buyers got their cattle here in August, at about \$4.60. These distillery cattle sold in Chicago this spring and early summer at \$8.50 to \$9.60, making the feeders a barrel of money. Colorado beef steers have sold at \$6 to \$6.50 here this week, and quarantine steers are selling at \$4.25 to \$5.00, the latter being highly mixed in quality. Range grass cows and heifers of decent quality have sold this week at \$4.50 to \$6.15, bulls a quarter higher, \$4.10 to \$5.50, veals a shade lower, best \$9.50. Hogs received here this week 31,300, last week 29,900, same week last year 42,700. The market has exhibited great strength the last few days, based largely on a big spurt in provisions. September sales of stocks of meat in packing houses were heavy, and reduced the same heavily, arousing some anxiety on the part of packers about future supplies. Sheep received here this week 70,500, last week 68,400, same week last year 62,000. Receipts continue to upset theories of dealers, who have all figured on reduced supplies, as compared with last year, this fall. Unsteady gains have been made continually. Best lambs now bring \$6.50, feeding lambs \$5.50 to \$5.80, fat ewes \$3 to \$3.50, wethers up to \$3.85. As soon as receipts fall off a little there should be a quick reversal of present unsatisfactory conditions.
