The suit was unsuccessful.

NO VIOLENCE FEARED IN PFANSCHMIDT CASE

Quincy, Ill., Oct. 8.—Though Quincy and Adams county are stirred by the discovery of the bloody clothing, pointing to Ray Pfanschmidt as the murderer of his father, mother, sister and a boarder, no violence is feared. The feeling is bitter, especially in the Payson neighborhood, where the family lived. The talk of violence, however, is not at all general.

GETTING JURY FOR THE BECKER TRIAL

New York, Oct. 8.—With one juror in the box the second day of the trial of Police Lieutenant Becker, charged with the murder of Herman Rosenthal, was resumed before Justice Goff in the criminal branch of the supreme court today.

WILL BRING LEVY BACK TO PRISON

George Levy will likely be placed behind the bars of the Idaho penitentiary this week to continue his life sentence, he having violated his parole by returning to this country. Levy was arrested at Portland two weeks ago on a white slave charge, he having brought two women from Paris to this country. He was taken to Seattle and was to have been taken to New York, but as the prison board here revoked his parole and has notified the United States authorities, he will be returned to the penitentiary here for the remainder of his life.
