**COUNTY DIVISION  
BILLS NUMEROUS  
AT NEXT SESSION**

**Issue Is Paramount in Many of the Counties of the State—Party Politics Forgotten.**

If the hopes of county divisionists in Idaho are realized this state will be sub-divided into many smaller units than it is now composed of. Democrats will elect legislative tickets where Republicans should, and vice versa, means of importance during the next session of the legislature will be jeopardized and there will be the bitterest county division controversy staged in the history of the state. In addition other counties are face to face with the removal of county seats, party lines in these counties have been eliminated, and a most unusual condition exists.

Judge Charles F. McCarthy of the Third judicial district for Ada county, has just rendered a decision that adds interest to the county split situation, having ruled that in Boise county, one of the largest in area and smallest in population in the western part of the state, residents may have a choice of casting their votes for either Montour or Waverly as the permanent seats of government for that county. Both towns wanted the exclusive right to the government seat. Montour, a new town on the Idaho Northern railroad, first made applications. Its opponents objected and petitioned to permit the electors to vote on the town of Waverly. Judge McCarthy held that both petitions were legal and the electors could at the general election take their choice. Idaho City, once one of the greatest gold camps in the west, now but a small mining town, is the present county seat of Boise county and apparently has been lost in the race.

**Fight in Lincoln County.**  
The most bitter county division fight has been waged in Lincoln county. There three factions are busily at work to split the county into three parts, one to retain the present county seat at Shoshone, the second to name Gooding as a county seat and the third to so designate the town of Jerome. In that county at the recent primary election, over 900 Republicans voted the Democratic ticket to elect the candidates who stood for county division. Party issues were relegated into oblivion and the issues became division and anti-division. Irrespective of whether the Democratic or the Re-

**Would Remove County Seat.**

Cassia county, of which Albion is now the county seat, is threatened with a removal county seat fight, for petitions were circulated to vote on the question of removing it from Albion to Burley and were granted by the courts. Albion is making a hard fight to hold the seat of government. Burley, a progressive little city in that county, is just as determined to be designated as the county seat.

During the last regular session of the legislature Fremont county asked to be segregated into triplets for the creation of three new counties out of the one, but the legislature could not see it that way and the big county is still Fremont. But there is a division movement on again there and the Fremont triplets are expected to ask to be baptised by the next session of the legislature. The previous session did divide Bingham county, creating Bonneville with Idaho Falls as the county seat. It also divided Washington county to create Adams, but showed particular parental interest to north Idaho, dividing Nez Perce county into three parts, leaving old Nez Perce in one, and Clearwater and Lewis as the two new ones. The north will probably not ask for a division at the next session.

**Even Ada Is Attacked.**

Ada county, of which Boise is the center, is to be made the center of attack on division for the county wants a segregation from the north end, which is principally Boise, and will carry a division fight to the legislature. Meridian is slated as the seat of the new county. The segregation is asked for to permit the south section to make its improvements in easier stages and not at as rapid a rate as Boise wishes.

The division fight in Oneida county calls for the creation of Power and a third county on the east side with Preston as the county seat. The Republican and Democratic legislative tickets are fighting out the issue and regardless of which win seats in the legislature, Oneida county will participate a lively county division fight at the next session.
