Wife of Murdered Gambler Tells of Money Transactions Between Her Husband and Defendant.

New York, Oct. 15.—Mrs. Rosenthal, wife of the murdered gambler, was a witness at the Becker trial this morning. She testified that she knew her husband and Becker had business transactions and had learned their nature from Becker at her home.

GOVERNOR WILL SPEAK TONIGHT

Leaves Tomorrow Morning for an Extended Trip to Southeastern Idaho.

Governor Hawley will deliver his only address of the campaign in Boise tonight at the Pinney theater. Tomorrow morning he will leave on an extended tour of the southeast.

Leaves Boise on No. 18, 2:40 a. m., Oct. 17, arrives at Montpelier 2:40 p. m.; speaks in Montpelier at night; leaves Montpelier 7:10 a. m. Friday morning, Oct. 18, for McCammon; leaves McCammon 1 p. m. for Weston; speaks in Weston at 2 p. m.; conveys to Franklin; speaks at Franklin at 4 p. m. and Preston at night.

SERVED WHISKEY AS COFFEE ON SUNDAY

That whiskey can be purchased on Sunday nights after the saloons close and that a drink known to imbibers as "coffee royal" is being dispensed at the Mexican chili joint at 118 South Sixth street, was the testimony given in Judge Bower's court this morning by Pat Welch, complaining witness in the case against Delfino Real, charged with petit larceny, whom Welch alleged stole \$10 from him Sunday evening when he gave him a wink and asked for a bottle of whiskey, which he received, and then threw down a \$20 gold piece, from which he did not get any change back.

Welch admitted that he was somewhat under the influence of liquor when he entered the place and that a man named John Sullivan was with him. He testified that he ordered coffee for two, gave a wink for a "coffee royal," which he received, paid his money and at the same time laid a \$20 gold piece on the counter for a bottle, which he received, but that he got no change back. His testimony was corroborated by John Sullivan, who testified that he had seen Welch place the \$20 gold piece and a dime on the table and knew that he did not get his change back and that he went out to look for an officer to inform him about the matter.

Officer Briggs, who happened in the place just after the change matter came up, testified that he did not see any of the affair, but thought the matter was a put up job on the part of Welch, declaring that Welch was drunk and that he asked Mr. Hall, proprietor of the White House saloon, who was sitting in the restaurant, how much money Welch had given Real, and was informed that he had given him 10 cents. Yesterday Hall was in court and made the statement that the case was one of blackmail on the part of Welch and that he would be on hand to testify today. When asked if he would be certain to be there without a subpoena, he replied that he would and seemed to be exceedingly anxious to testify in the case, but when the case came up today he was not present and an attempt to find him proved a failure.

Judge Bower found Real guilty of the charge against him and imposed a fine amounting to the costs of prosecution.

7. "Shall Section 2 of Article 9 of the Constitution of the State of Idaho be so amended that the general supervision of the Educational Institutions and Public School System of the State of Idaho shall be vested in a State Board of Education, the membership, powers and duties of which shall be prescribed by law? The State Superintendent of Public Instruction shall be ex-officio member of said board.
8. (a) "Shall Section 6 of Article 18 of the Constitution of the State of Idaho be amended so as to make the county treasurer ex-officio tax collector?
(b) "Shall Section 6 of Article 18 of the Constitution of the State of Idaho be amended so as to authorize county treasurers and ex-officio tax collectors to employ deputies and clerical assistance when so empowered by the Board of County Commissioners?"
