SHIPMENT OF BAD APPLES RESULTS IN TWO ARRESTS

State Horticultural Inspector or Is Enforcing Statute Against the Shipment of Wormy Fruit.

State Horticultural Inspector John U. McPherson and his deputies are hot on the trail of fruit growers who persist in packing and shipping wormy apples and placing them on the market or disposing of them to consumers. Two arrests in the past two days, resulting in the conviction of the defendant in one case, are the net results. The inspector and his deputies have evidence to show that other growers are almost on the verge of violating the law and unless they are careful there will be other prompt arrests.

C. B. Marlatt of Gooding, owner of an orchard near Caldwell in charge of H. K. Emmerson, was arraigned in court at Gooding charged with violating the law in the shipment of wormy apples and convicted. He was fined \$25 and costs. This case is one of the most flagrant. State Horticultural Inspector McPherson and his deputies had warned Emmerson not to ship the apples as they were in a wormy condition. He promised not to do so. However, the first thing the department knew the apples had been shipped to Gooding and sold to consumers. When this was discovered Marlatt was promptly arrested, fined and severely reprimanded. All of the apples, 100 boxes, were confiscated and condemned.

The second arrest took place when J. M. Hoover of this city was taken into custody charged with shipping 250 boxes of wormy apples. He had been warned not to pack and ship the fruit, and promised not to do so, it is claimed by the inspector. The apples were shipped just the same, it is charged, and his arrest followed. An inspection of the apples showed that there were approximately 50 wormy apples to the box, at least there were that many in a number of boxes examined. Hoover will be arraigned in justice court. In the meantime the inspector and his deputies are on the trail of other growers who are suspected of violating the law.

AN APPETIZING MENU AT THE OLD WORLD MARKET

The ladies will also have brown bread and white, all home made, and crisp brown doughnuts and cakes to sell for people who care for these good things for their Sunday dinner. The affair is in charge of the Ladies' Aid of the Presbyterian church.

Lutheran Mission in Boise.

The coming Sunday will see the Evangelical Lutheran mission mount a step higher in its march of progress. Slowly but surely this mission has been gaining ground until it is now but a question of time to its organization as a regular congregation. Next Sunday the Mission Sunday school will be opened and a large regular attendance is looked for. A goodly number have already enrolled. The school will meet at the church, 817 Franklin street. All children not already belonging to a Sunday school are heartily invited to join in a class. There will be a change in the church service proper, beginning Nov. 17, when there will be a German service each Sunday at 11 a. m. and an English service each Sunday evening at 7:45.
