THIRD TICKET IN KOOTENAI COUNTY MERELY A BLIND

The Claim That It Has the Backing of Progressives Is Denied by Paul Clagstone.

The placing of a third party ticket in the field in Kootenai county under the blind that it had the sanction of the Progressives, was but a move on the part of reactionaries led by ex-State Senator Spalding, to defeat the Republican legislative candidates, pledged to the re-election of Senator Borah. The deal is exposed by Paul Clagstone, who was defeated by a small margin as the Republican party's nominee for governor, and who is familiar with the Kootenai county situation. In an interview he says: "In Kootenai county there has been some sort of misunderstanding, and a third county ticket has been put up. It was filed by petition on the last day of the election. While there are some real Progressives on the ticket who have been fooled by it, the majority of it denounce the third county ticket. "It was fostered by some old machine politicians, like Senator Spalding. Its real object is to defeat the Republican candidates for the legislature and thus injure Senator Borah's chances of election. "Some of those nominated on the ticket have declared they will withdraw, and I think all the real Progressives will withdraw. The Progressives must support the Republican legislative ticket in order to re-elect Senator Borah."

That Court Decision. "There are two reasons why I can not express just how I feel regarding the decision of the supreme court of Idaho in refusing to allow the Roosevelt electors on the official ballot. "One reason is because of my limited vocabulary, and the second is that I don't desire to be cited for contempt of court. "But while this decision has been embarrassing to the Progressives of Idaho, it has at the same time aroused such a storm of indignation all over the state that the Progressives are more determined than ever to carry the state for Roosevelt and repudiate the supreme court for this decision. "The Progressives will try to get the case reopened. Whether they will succeed or not I can not venture a guess. But the fight will go on just the same. "The Progressives will carry on a campaign of education to instruct the people how to write in the names of the Roosevelt electors. There is some fear expressed that the reactionaries may find some technicality by which the court would prohibit a sticker campaign. Keep T. R. Electors' Names. "If not, then stickers will be put out. But every man and woman in Idaho should paste these four names somewhere, that they can always have them: H. C. Olney, H. Harland, L. M. Earl, E. M. Harney. These are the four Roosevelt electors. The people can write them on the ballot and vote for Roosevelt that way."

Mr. Clagstone sent a telegram of sympathy to Colonel Roosevelt, telling him that the Progressives of Idaho would "work 10 times as hard" to carry the state since the decision of the court, and saying that he felt sure Idaho would send Roosevelt electors.

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GREAT ACTIVITY IS BEING SHOWN BY THIRD PARTY

Progressives Are Compelled to Increase Their Force at Headquarters — Itineraries of the Speakers.

There is more activity evident at Progressive state headquarters than at any time since the campaign opened. O. V. Badley, candidate for secretary of state, has taken charge of the active work of organization and the letters he has sent out have been productive of great good as shown by the enthusiastic replies received daily at headquarters. Mr. Badley offered to take the stump speaking every day and night until election or to take up the work in headquarters. It was decided to place him at headquarters. Three additional stenographers have been added to handle the correspondence which is growing by leaps and bounds since the result of the decision upon the disfranchisement case brought by the Republican state central committee became known. Two additional mailing clerks have been added, also, to send out literature explaining how to write the missing names upon the ballot. "It is only a question of getting the votes in," said Mr. Badley today. "We need to do up little campaigning; that has been done for us. All we need to do is to show the people how to write in the names of the electors and we are doing that daily and the returns are so encouraging that we have no doubt whatever, but Roosevelt will still carry the state."
