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any came to be the accepted nominee of the Federalist party. Heskiah Niles, whose "Register" is a famous repository of facts of our early history, says he tried to find out but failed.

Jefferson and Burr got their nominations for president and vice president, respectively, although Burr exacted a promise from the party leaders that they would endeavor to make his vote equal that of Jefferson as a condition of his acceptance.

Hamilton wrote James A. Bayard, the Federalist leader in the house, hailing from Delaware, appealing to him to prevent the election of Burr.

There were great doings in Washington when the house took up the election of a president. Although the journey to Washington was tiresome and expensive, people hastened there by the hundreds.

Such an election as the Jefferson-Burr contest can never happen again, since the Twelfth amendment now makes it impossible for a candidate for vice president to oppose the head of his ticket in a house election.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS. 1. "Shall Section 1 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Idaho be so amended as to give the people the power (under conditions to be hereafter prescribed by act of the legislature) to propose a referendum vote on any act or measure passed by the State Legislature and to approve or reject the same at the polls, independent of the Legislature?"

Said election shall be open at eight o'clock in the morning and will continue until seven o'clock in the evening of the same day. Dated this 14th day of October, A. D. 1912.
