

HOGS LOWER BUT BACON IS HIGHER

Hay and Grain Markets Continue Steady with Offerings Strong.

While hogs are lower than last month, bacon shows an advance of one cent per pound and the supply is not overly strong. The hay and grain market continues unusually steady with offerings strong. The livestock market is well supplied with everything but cattle, which are a little below normal. New Turkish pigs were added to the fruit market this morning and also stuffed dates. 

FORECAST FOR BOISE AND VICINITY—Unsettled weather with rain tonight or Thursday; cooler Thursday.

DAILY REPORT—Highest temperature yesterday, 65; lowest temperature this morning, 38; mean temperature yesterday, 54. Total precipitation for the 24 hours ending at 6 a. m., .02 of an inch.

CONDITIONS—Two barometric depressions are shown this morning, one covering the entire northwest, and reaching southward to Arizona and the other extending from the lower lake region to the south Atlantic coast, while the upper lake region and the Mississippi valley are overcast by a great high pressure field. Precipitation has occurred generally in the eastern states and on the middle and north Pacific slope. The following heavy precipitation is reported: Buffalo, N. Y., 2.36; Raleigh, N. C., 1.22; Portland, Ore., 1.03. Much warmer weather prevails in the Rocky mountain and plateau states, while in the Mississippi and Ohio valleys and the lake region the weather is much cooler.
