## LECTION OF 1836 NOT UNLIKE THAT OF PRESENT YEAR

Van Buren Secured Majority in Electoral College Over the Allies.

### BITTER CAMPAIGN BY THE DEMOCRATS

Accused Everyone Opposed to Them as Being Bribed by the United States Bank—Jackson Took More Delight in Van Buren's Election Than in Any Victory Ever Won by Himself.

There were many events in the election of 1836, when Van Buren won out against a whole field of candidates, which may yet find a parallel in the presidential election of 1912. It has been suggested by some that if Roosevelt and Taft together poll more votes than Wilson, and if a combination of all electors should represent a majority in the electoral colleges, some way may yet be found to bring that majority to the support of one or the other before the electoral colleges meet and vote in January. However this may be, that was one of the ideas that animated the opposition to Van Buren in 1836. Divers and sundry factions were opposed to Jackson and to his method of picking his successor, factions which could not find any platform upon which they could all unite, but which were willing to fight in a common cause provided they could fight independently. In this opposition there were the anti-Masons, the protective tariff men, the States Rights, the anti-Jacksonites and the remnants of other "isms."

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Had Nothing to Lose.  
If such a result should eventuate, they reasoned, one of two things could happen—either the anti-Van Buren electors could all unite on one man, and thus elect him; or, if that scheme failed, they could throw the election in the house and trust to God for the rest. From their standpoint they had everything to gain and nothing to lose by such a course, for the worst that could happen would be the elevation of Van Buren to the presidential chair. Their scheme failed for the good reason that when the vote was counted Van Buren had more votes than all of them together.

Jackson's determination to have Van Buren succeed him was such that he even went so far, it is said, as to have signed in order that Vice President Van Buren might become president by that route. But if he did think these things he thought afterward that he could aid Van Buren better while he himself sat in the presidential chair. Tennessee got into the game early by nominating Senator White. Its legislature, in the face of the hardest pressure Jackson could bring to bear upon its members, nominated White by a vote that lacked but two of being unanimous. Jackson had some terrible charges against White printed in his organ, the Washington Globe, and copies of these charges were franked to the members of the Tennessee legislature, some of them addressed in Jackson's own handwriting. But they had no effect. Alabama followed the lead of Tennessee, although its legislature afterward rescinded this action.

Tennessee having nominated White in January, 1835, Jackson was forced to get Van Buren in nomination nearly a year and a half ahead of the election. He suggested that a national convention be called to meet in Baltimore. This was done, and 626 delegates took part. In these days of precise representation the story of that convention makes one laugh. Of this number of delegates, 151 were from Maryland, 108 from Virginia and 73 from New Jersey. It seems that the Maryland state convention, not wishing to discriminate,

that there was no distinction. During the campaign the several candidates were questioned upon the issues before the people. Not one of them dodged and their answers were widely circulated. They related to the bank issue, the expunging of the resolution of censure which congress had adopted against Jackson, the apportionment of the public lands among the states and the distribution of the surplus in the treasury.

Jackson Was Delighted.  
Jackson never took any keener delight in any victory won by himself than in that of electing Van Buren. Before the inauguration he said that it would be a great pleasure to him to go up to the capitol to see the senate witness the inauguration of a president whom it had refused to confirm as minister to England, with the oath of office administered by Chief Justice Roger B. Taney, whom it also had once turned down. He and Van Buren, accompanied by a military escort, rode to the capitol and back to the White House in a phaeton built out of wood from the old frigate Constitution.

Jackson did not exercise any particular reactivity over Van Buren. He retired to his home, "Hermilage," just outside of Nashville, but he did live long enough to dictate the election of still another candidate for the presidency and once more defeat his ancient enemy, Henry Clay for that high office.

## WAVERLY IS PUT OUT OF RACE BY SUPREME COURT

Fight for County Seat of Boise County Narrowed Down to Montour and Idaho City.

Montour Wins; Waverly Loses.  
The following telegram was received at the supreme court this morning from I. W. Hart, clerk of the supreme court, now in session at Lewiston: "Lewiston, Ida., Oct. 24, 1912. "Flora J. Millsaps, "Deputy Clerk Supreme court, Boise: "In Boise county seat case entitled Lippencott against Carpenter, the name of Montour must be placed on ballot and the name of Waverly omitted. The judgment of the district court is reversed. Notify John F. MacLane and Karl Paine. "I. W. HART, Clerk."

Montour, the new town laid out in Boise county along the right-of-way of the Idaho Northern railway extension on the Payette river, won out in the supreme court of this state over Waverly, also a new platted townsite, as the town entitled to go upon the official ballot to be voted in Boise county Nov. 5 in the contest with Idaho City for the removal of the county seat from that place. The above telegram received today from I. W. Hart, clerk of the supreme court to Deputy Clerk Flora J. Millsaps, in charge of the supreme court chambers here, shows that the high tribunal of this state reversed Judge Charles F. McCarthy of the district court for Ada county in his opinion that the petitions for both Montour and Waverly are legal and both were entitled to go upon the official ballot. The supreme court's decision differs with that of Judge McCarthy in that it is held Waverly should be omitted and Montour should be placed on the ballot.

Fight Waged for Months.  
The case is one of unusual importance in Boise county where the county seat removal fight has been waged for months. Montour was the first town to make a bid for the county seat in the event of removal from Idaho City, which, since the formation of the county has had the distinction of being the local seat of government. Montour was recently platted along the extension of the right of way of the Idaho Northern railway, and its backers as well as the residents of the county in that vicinity put forth their claims for the county seat.

Waverly later became a factor in the county removal fight when it became apparent there was to be one, and made claim to the right to go before the voters of the county. Waverly is located above Horseshoe Bend on the Payette river and its backers and the residents in that part of the county have been urgent in their claims for the seat of government.

Factional differences have sprung up and the contest for the right to go before electors for the seat of government became decidedly interesting.

Immediately following the handing down of the district court decision by Judge McCarthy, appeal to the supreme court was filed by those opposed to his ruling and the case was recently argued and submitted to that body at Lewiston by Judge John F. MacLane and Karl Paine. It was taken under advisement. The supreme court reached its decision and has just notified the parties interested.


