The Staffordshire constabulary has been asked to help the distracted wife in her hunt over a continent for the missing quarryman.

"Mrs. Grayson, who resides in this town, is very anxious to obtain some news of her husband, from whom she has not heard since January, 1910.

"She has written to the captain in charge of the camp but he can give her no information. She has been informed that in April, 1910, four men were drowned in a ferry boat while crossing a river at Boville and she fears that one of these may have been her husband.

TAFT'S GROWING STRENGTH. Figures from Four States Place Him Safely Ahead of Debs.

The esteemed Statesman continues to dilate on the drift of voters Taft-ward and we are pleased to assemble some facts that will help it out in its strenuous efforts.

In Ohio Taft leads Debs by a little more than 2 to 1, the poll showing 4266 for Taft to 2087 for Debs. All must concede that this is come sprinting on the part of the president.

In Indiana, Taft has a safe lead, but not so large as in Ohio, the poll showing 3071 for Taft to 2253 for Debs. This is certainly very flattering to the president.

In West Virginia Taft also looms up a little more than 2 to 1 ahead of Debs, polling 1021 to 486 for the latter. That man Wilson, however, here also maintains a striking gait with 3016 to 1890 for Roosevelt.

From the above figures it is safe to wager your money that Taft will secure more votes than Debs. In fact, many well-informed prognosticators concede this.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

1. "Shall Section 1 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Idaho be so amended as to give the people the power (under conditions to be hereafter prescribed by act of the legislature) to propose a referendum vote on any act or measure passed by the State Legislature and to approve or reject the same at the polls, independent of the Legislature?"

Said election shall be open at eight o'clock in the morning and will continue until seven o'clock in the evening of the same day. Dated this 14th day of October, A. D. 1912.
