

INSINUATION OF MORNING ORGAN NEEDS NO ANSWER

Despicable Character of the Campaign Against Martin Is Shown in Latest Attempt of Interests.

"The desperate and despicable character of the fight being made by representatives of the special interests to accomplish the defeat of G. H. Martin, Progressive candidate for governor, is shown in the issue of the morning organ of these special interests," declared State Chairman James H. Gipsen this morning.

"It will be noticed that in the same issue of that paper which defends Governor Hawley for unconstitutional and illegal expenditure of hundreds of dollars of the taxpayers' money of the state, there appears an article designed by the meanest and nastiest kind of insinuation to give the impression that Mr. Martin is in some manner connected with wrongful acts of certain McNicholas brothers.

"There is not a single statement of fact in that article nor a single legitimate inference to be drawn connecting Mr. Martin with any wrong doing that these men may have done, even if they have done any which does not appear except the statement that a grand jury in Ohio returned an indictment against them, yet the purpose of the article is to give the impression that in some manner Mr. Martin is involved.

"The facts as narrated in that paper itself are that Mr. Martin and one of the McNicholas brothers are both interested in a mining company somewhere, place not named, and then the statement is made that the McNicholas brothers were indicted for the sale of mining stock in Oregon and Idaho. The only name of any mining property mentioned is that of a company in Oregon.

"The real animus and the real nastiness of the morning organ is shown in its further statement that in none of the reports of the operations of the McNicholas brothers, which it is claimed, resulted in their indictment, was the name of any mining property involved mentioned, yet this paper desires to give the impression that this Idaho company in which Mr. Martin owns some stock and of which it is alleged he is secretary-treasurer, MAY have been one of those companies.

"The paper is forced to admit that the McNicholas brothers have not been arrested although the alleged indictment was returned some time ago. Martin in No Way Connected.

"There is not a word in the story, aside from the wilful and intentional nastiness in bringing in Mr. Martin's name, to connect him in any manner whatsoever with any wrongdoing.

"And this comes from the same organ which is supporting John M. Haines editorially and James H. Hawley in its news columns. It comes from the same organ which has had not one word to tell the public of the manipulation and organization of the Idaho State Life Insurance company by John M. Haines and his 'professional promoter' associates whereby they got out of innocent investors of this state \$125,000 in commissions and a vastly larger sum, as it appears, from manipulation of stock sold to themselves at a low price without so much as putting up a dollar and selling it over again to other investors. This manipulation and organization was made the subject of investigation and special report by the insurance departments of Washington, Idaho and Utah and the record they show is sufficient to condemn any man, yet there is not a word said about that, but the ends of the earth are searched for something which may be misconstrued, distorted and twisted into an insinuation against the good name of G. H. Martin, simply and wholly because he stands out in this campaign as the friend of the people.

"So far as any facts contained in the Statesman story this morning, it charges nothing more against Martin than the facts in the Idaho Life Insurance company contains charges against me because my father and I were suckers enough to get caught with some of John M. Haines' phoney insurance stock.

"They have searched the earth to find something against Martin and this is all they can find. It is the most conclusive proof possible that he is one of the finest and best men on earth, for if he wasn't they sure have shown

CASE MAY GO TO HIGHEST COURT

Litigation Which Is the Result of the Halley Bank Failure.

Judge Walters of the Fourth judicial district for Blaine county has handed down a decision in a case that grew out of the failure of the Idaho State bank at Halley that will, it is believed, result in an appeal being carried to the United States supreme court.

The decision is in the suit instituted by Sullivan & Sullivan of this city to recover for their clients, Clara Mills and some 60 other depositors of the defunct Idaho State bank, approximately \$25,000 from the American Surety company of New York, surety for William G. Cruise, former state bank examiner, upon the ground that Cruise failed to examine the bank for at least one year prior to its failure and that he had knowledge of the condition of the bank when he was in.

Counsel for the surety company, Richards & Haga, of this city, filed a petition for removal to the federal court. The date for hearing on this motion was set for Oct. 14, but Richards & Haga are said to have failed to appear on the date of the argument and Sullivan & Sullivan moved a denial of the petition which was granted. Later Judge Walters agreed to reopen the case and permit Richards & Haga to argue their motion and this was done. The court then took the matter under advisement.

The case is one of the many that have grown out of the Halley bank failure and if it is removed to the federal court it is believed that the entire history of the wrecking of that institution will be gone into directly, connecting all parties who are responsible.

advanced, and party leaders are not inclined to ignore it. In fact, many Republicans are not unwilling to say that if Idaho must have a Democratic senator if only for a month, Governor Hawley would be their selection. And the governor could make that appointment in the event of his defeat for re-election, without injuring himself politically, for he would retire from the office Jan. 1, 1913, as governor and at the same time have the distinction of being an ex-United States senator, it is claimed by his supporters.

Played Politics Before.

It is not altogether new for the governor to play politics, party men say. They point out his fine Italian hand was clearly shown in his defeat of the senatorial plank proposed for the Democratic platform, for he wished to prevent an endorsement of a candidate for United States senator at the primaries, binding on the next legislature. They say he would be just as willing to play the same game if defeated for governor in order to satisfy his ambition to become United States senator for a month.

Party leaders are really at a loss to figure out what the governor may do in the event of his re-election and the legislature becoming Republican. They believe he will present the recess appointment, in that event to the strongest north Idaho man he can


son, 15 for Taft and 1 for Chafin. The vote was then taken on governor and it showed Martin 29, Hawley 9 and Haines 6.
