

FOWL MARKET IS WELL SUPPLIED

Receipts of Turkeys, Ducks and Geese Heavy and Demand Good.

The receipts of turkeys, ducks and geese were quite liberal on the local market this morning and the offerings, being the first of the season, caused an active market and no trouble was experienced in disposing of all the fowls.



FORECAST FOR BOISE AND VICINITY—Fair and cooler tonight; Sunday, fair. DAILY REPORT—Highest temperature yesterday, 65; lowest temperature this morning, 42; mean temperature yesterday, 57. CONDITION—High barometric pressure prevails except over the Rocky mountain region and on the Atlantic coast and precipitation has been confined to the Pacific slope and a few scattered points in the north-east. Higher temperatures prevail over most of the country, particularly on the northern Rocky mountain slope and in the extreme southwest, but it is much cooler in Oregon and southwestern Idaho. Fair weather may be expected in this vicinity tonight and Sunday, with still lower temperature tonight.

Boston, Oct. 26.—The Commercial Bulletin says of the wool market today: Notwithstanding an imminent presidential election, the wool market, decided strength. Manufacturers are steady buyers in the market and sellers find no difficulty in maintaining prices.

The shipments of wool from Boston from January 1 to October 24, inclusive, were 333,591,358 pounds, against 262,262,247 pounds for the same period last year. The relatively most active zones are the west, northwest and southwest, which sections have been blessed by bounteous crops. Shipping rooms, particularly of dry goods houses, are overtaxed in getting out orders, and manufacturers in most industries are working to capacity. The iron and steel industry continues in an enviable position, further advances in prices are being made,
