

BOISE HIGH KEEPS ITS RECORD CLEAR IN ANOTHER GAME

Caldwell Is Defeated by Score of 53 to 0—Locals Not Scored Against This Season.

Results Yesterday's Games.
At Boise—Boise high 53, Caldwell 0.
At Weiser—Weiser 14, Payette 6.
Boise and Weiser, the two high standing teams in the interscholastic league are left to play off the championship.
Next Saturday, Boise meets Salt Lake high to decide the intermountain championship.

Coach Worthwain's moleskin wearers, the Boise high school football eleven, swung into interscholastic league action again yesterday afternoon at Cody park with the Caldwell high as their victims. The final score jumped to 53 to 0 for Boise before the slaughter could be stopped in the last of the fourth quarter. Forced to play an uphill game, Caldwell was plucky to the last, playing harder football during the final half than the first. Worthwain's speeders did not seem to take the game seriously the first half, but the fierce playing of Caldwell in the second awoke them from their trance and they were forced to fight back.

Scoring Starts Early.
Boise started the scoring early, kicking to Caldwell the local high school players cut the runner down in his tracks by hard tackling and then held for downs. With the ball in Caldwell territory the forward pass was brought into play and the pigskin sailed to Horrie, who crossed Caldwell's goal line for the first touchdown. Johnston kicked the goal. After that it was but a question of how many points Boise wanted. V. Brown scored the second touchdown before the quarter was over on a quarterback run and Johnston kicked the goal. The score: Boise 12, Caldwell 0.
Johnston went over Caldwell's line for the third touchdown immediately after the second quarter opened, breaking over the white strip on a line plunge. He failed to kick the goal, Caldwell kicked to Boise. Alexander returned the ball 35 yards, but fumbled. Caldwell attempted to punt, the pigskin was fumbled rolling backwards and went to Boise. After long

end runs by Gerlough and Johnston the latter took the ball over for a touchdown. Brown kicked the goal. Score: Boise 26, Caldwell 0.
Caldwell took a decided brace when the third quarter opened and Boise awoke to the fact it would have to play stiff football to keep the Booster City students from scoring. Snow was substituted for Johnston at half after 10 minutes of hard line bucking and end runs. Brown went over for a touchdown. Horrie failed to kick the goal. Snow scored a few minutes later on an end run. Score: Boise 32, Caldwell 0.
The last quarter opened with Caldwell fighting gamely. The Boise line was attacked for small gains. Caldwell then fell back on the forward pass and gained, but in attempting a long pass luck was against Caldwell for V. Brown intercepted the ball and made a 60-yard line for a touchdown. He kicked the goal. Wicher relieved Nourse at fullback and scored the last touchdown on a line buck. Final score: Boise 53, Caldwell 0.
The Boise team has the distinction of not being scored against this season. It has defeated Payette Moose 47 to 0, Baker high school 44 to 0, Nampa 61 to 0 and Caldwell 53 to 0, having run up a grand total of 205 points.

Seattle, Oct. 26.—Before an enormous crowd and with ideal weather the University of Washington warriors met the University of Idaho football team on Denny Field this afternoon for the first important battle of the season.

OPPOSED TO GAMBLING ON FOOTBALL GAMES

The ban is placed on football gambling.
The attention of Coach Worthwain of the local high school football team, has been called to the fact that wagers as to the outcome of the Boise-Salt Lake football game, which is to be played here next Saturday, are already being laid. The coach realizes that there is no way to control this evil as the betting is being done by people outside of school, but he is requesting that this feature be eliminated from this game.
"The game of football," said the coach, "is purely an amateur form of athletics; various attempts have been made to get up professional football teams, but they have always failed because the professional spirit and the right kind of football spirit are inconsistent.
"When people have money up on the outcome of a game they cannot take the same clean sportsmanlike interest in the game that they do when they have no financial interest in the game.
"Our boys are sure to play their hardest and to do their best to win for Boise, but football is a game which the misplay of one man may lose a game; when that happens, as it often does, the persons who have lost money through that player's mistake cannot regard that player in the same light as if there had been no money up on the game.
"Football is an amateur sport, played best by teams representing educational institutions. We are very anxious to have the undivided support of every person in Boise, but we do not think that this support should go to the extent of betting on the team.
"In fact, this is the surest way to kill the great autumn game. The people of this city will not tolerate a game in the school system which causes waging."

PRINCETON STILL IS UNDEFEATED

Brilliant Field Work Overcomes Superior Weight of Dartmouth.

Princeton, N. J., Oct. 26.—Princeton continued her march toward the championship this afternoon, defeating the Dartmouth eleven, 22 to 7. Brilliant running with the ball on the part of Hobe Baker and Captain Pendleton was largely responsible for the victory. Dartmouth's weight told in the first quarter, Whitney and Morrey, the husky halfbacks, plunging consistently for a touchdown early in the fray. Princeton followed with a touchdown after recovering a fumble in Dartmouth territory, but the goal was missed, leaving Dartmouth a one point lead. A few moments later Baker booted over a neat place kick and the first half ended with Princeton two points to the good.
In the second half Princeton's speed told, the beefy green warriors tiring perceptibly. Baker tore off some good runs in the third period, but the quarter ended with no scoring.

Soldiers Field, Cambridge, Mass., Oct. 26.—With Right Halfback Brickley in brilliant form, Harvard easily defeated Brown here today by a score of 30 to 10, in one of the best football games ever witnessed on Soldiers Field. Pretty field goals, brilliant forward passes and spectacular runs featured the game. Brickley was easily the star, scoring 16 of Harvard's 30 points.
In the first period Brickley kicked a field goal from the 30-yard line and later intercepted a forward pass, running 40 yards for a touchdown. He kicked two other field goals during the game, which was called near the end of the last period on account of darkness.
